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an original interpretation of hume s philosophy as centered on the relationship between theory and practice the author argues that hume s essays and history represent a humanist practical philosophy derived from the speculative philosophy of a treatise of human nature and the enquiries

although david riesman wrote over half a century ago his concept of autonomy as presented in the lonely crowd 1950 speaks directly to the intellectual and emotional disarrangements of the twenty first century the current malaise produced by the excesses of commodity culture information technology the hyperreal and fake news militate against our ability to think critically about contemporary society and while postmodern authors insist that this bewildering situation weakens and assails our critical thinking skills riesman s notion of autonomy refuses to capitulate to such a somber interpretation rather he is convinced that individuals have the intellectual and emotional mettle to think for themselves and not be drawn into the demands of a commercialized culture and a commodity driven lifestyle as we pick and choose the terms of our engagement we can remain aloof from society s engulfing influence and preserve the oppositional thinking needed for democracy to illustrate this point most clearly this book puts riesman into conversation with the writings of theodor adorno whose evaluation of the critical faculty s ability to withstand the culture industry is famously pessimistic

intended for introductory classes focusing on philosophy of mind theories of mind includes readings from primary sources edited to suit the needs of the beginner edited selections focus on vivid examples and counter examples and meet the needs of instructors concerned with assigning accessible primary source material that can serve as a foundation for more advanced studies in philosophy

it has long been argued that an age of biography is upon us certainly the life story now has a well recognised role as a key resource in social research this book is the first to offer a comprehensive and practical guide to carrying out

one fundamental topic of scientific inquiry in psychology is the study of what william james called the stream of consciousness our ongoing experience of the world and ourselves from within our inner experiences these internal states aka stimulus independent thoughts include inner speech mental imagery feelings sensory awareness internally produced sounds or music unsymbolized thinking and mentalizing thinking about others mental states they may occur automatically during mind wandering daydreaming and resting state episodes and may focus on one s past present or future mental time travel e g autonoetic consciousness inner experiences also may take the form of intrusive or ruminative thoughts the types characteristics frequency content and functions of inner experiences have been studied using a variety of traditional methods among which questionnaires thought listing procedures i e open ended self reports thinking aloud techniques and daily dairies another approach articulatory suppression consists in blocking participants use of verbal thinking while completing a given task deficits indicate that inner speech plays a causal role in normal task completion various thought sampling approaches have also been developed in an effort to gather more ecologically valid data previous thought sampling studies have relied on beepers that signal participants to report aspects of their inner experiences at random intervals more recent studies are exploiting smartphone technology to easily and reliably probe randomly occurring inner experiences in large samples of participants these various measures have allowed researchers to learn some fundamental facts about inner experiences to illustrate it is becoming increasingly clear that prospection future oriented thinking greatly depends on access to autobiographical memory past oriented thinking where recollection of past scenes is used as a template to formulate plausible future scenarios the main goal of the

present research topic was to offer a scientific platform for the dissemination of current high quality research pertaining to inner experiences although data on all forms of inner experiences were welcome reports on recent advances in inner speech research were particularly encouraged here are some examples of topics of interest 1 description and validation of new scales inventories questionnaires measuring any form of inner experience 2 novel uses or improvements of existing measures of inner experiences 3 development of new smartphone technology facilitating or broadening the use of cell phones to sample inner experiences 4 frequency content and functions of various inner experience 5 correlations between personality or cognitive variables and any aspects of inner experiences 6 philosophical or theoretical considerations pertaining to inner experiences and 7 inner experience changes with age

dream exploring the preconditions possibilities and limitations of their own existence and ability to know the world the oneiric in lynch s films is thus of phenomenological media theoretical and philosophical interest
