it rolling that's how to initiate a process How to use it Use this idiom when you want to encourage someone to begin a task or project

6 Break a Leg Meaning Good luck especially before a performance Example Break a leg tonight Sarah I know you'll do great in the play Visual This idiom is a bit unusual While it literally means to break a leg the opposite is true it wishes for good luck How to use it Use this idiom to wish someone good luck particularly in a performance context Its important to know the context to avoid confusion

7 Once in a Blue Moon Meaning Very rarely infrequently Example We only go to that restaurant once in a blue moon Visual Imagine a blue moon a very rare celestial event that's how infrequent something is How to use it Use this idiom to emphasize the rarity of an event or occurrence

8 Under the Weather Meaning Slightly ill or unwell 3 Example Im feeling a bit under the weather today so Ill take a rest Visual Think of being under a cloudy stormy sky that's how you might feel when you're unwell How to use it Use this idiom to politely explain why you're not feeling well without going into too much detail

9 Spill the Beans Meaning To reveal a secret Example Dont spill the beans about the surprise party Visual Picture beans spilling out of a container the secret is now revealed How to use it This is a more informal way to say let the cat out of the bag Use it in casual conversations

10 Costs an Arm and a Leg Meaning Something is extremely expensive Example That new car costs an arm and a leg Visual Imagine literally paying with an arm and a leg that's how expensive something is How to use it Use this idiom to highlight the high cost of something

How to Practice Using Idioms Read widely Immerse yourself in English literature news articles and blogs Listen actively Pay attention to how native speakers use idioms in conversations and movies Keep a journal Write down new idioms you encounter along with their meanings and example sentences Use them in conversation The best way to learn is to use them Dont be afraid to make mistakes its part of the learning process

seminar paper from the year 2016 in the subject english language and literature studies linguistics grade 2 3 language english abstract whereas a lot of research has been done on the description comprehension and acquisition process of idioms the field of idiom teaching to english second language speakers has remained largely undiscussed therefore the aim of this short corpus study is to investigate the usage of idioms in the language of nonnative english speakers especially in the language production of german english second language learners esl students it is argued that esl students in germany do not use idiomatic language in their
