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this book presents the pioneering role of the women chemists at the london school of medicine for women lsmw the account is placed within the framework of the long forgotten background to the founding of this unique institution and the individuals whose lives came together to make it happen sophia jex blake elizabeth garrett

anderson edith pechey and isabel thorne the london school of medicine for women lsmw was the first school in britain to enable women to gain medical qualifications though its pioneering medical role is beginning to be recognized the chemistry department at the school has been totally overlooked all first year students at the lsmw had to spend a significant portion of their time taking theoretical and practical chemistry taught by dedicated women chemistry instructors in this book particular attention is given to each of these exceptionally talented women chemists who found a haven at and devoted their lives to the lsmw this book also covers the enthusiasm of the women medical students which becomes evident through the chemistry prose and poetry which they wrote this book will appeal to a wide readership interested in the early role of women in science and it is particularly relevant to those interested in the lives and contributions of pioneering women chemists

this book examines the relatively unknown english late victorian educational pioneer constance louisa maynard 1849 1935 whose innovative london based westfield college produced the first female bas in the mid 1880s an atypical and powerful woman maynard is also notable for her unique knowledge of psychology and patriotic evangelicalism both of which profoundly shaped her ambitions and passions in contrast to most history about an individual s life this book builds a fascinating life story based upon evidence and clues from minutia the focus is on nine enigmatic actions motivated by maynard in her quests for educational leadership global conversion and same sex love maynard s acts that she called mistakes caused deep enmities with administrators and college women yet amid her trials and conflicts maynard made key decisions about her public and private life moreover her so called mistakes reveal astonishing new insights into a past mindset and the rapidly changing world in which maynard lived

implications of these encounters the volume concludes with an examination of political consolidation after the country's attainment of political independence and the subsequent foundations for political authoritarianism

this accessible text provides an international study of critical educational leaders who established the foundation for early childhood education across continents in the 19th and early 20th centuries it places each pioneer within the time and culture in which they lived to help the reader understand how theories and knowledge about early years education and care have evolved over time early years pioneers in context traces key themes such as play child initiated learning working with parents scaffolding children's learning and the environment enabling students to reflect on the differences and similarities between the pioneers and understand their contribution to practice today pioneers covered include frederick froebel elizabeth peabody susan blow rudolf steiner margaret mcmillan maria montessori susan isaacs loris malaguzzi featuring student integration tasks to help the reader link key ideas to their own practice this will be essential reading for early years students on undergraduate and postgraduate degree courses

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
