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a collection of critical essays on the writing and films of american indian author sherman alexie

this volume includes a biographical sketch of sherman alexie which provides a guide to many of the most noteworthy incidents and circumstances of his life other essays explore impact of atrocities on his writing the identity of the american indian in modern writing and the author s broadening perspective on the human condition his poetry and contemporary critical reception are explored as well as the role of music storytelling and oral traditions in his work

the story of the american west is that of a journey it is the story of a movement of a geographical and human transition of the delineation of a route that would soon become a rooted myth the story of the american west has similarly journeyed across boundaries in a two way movement sometimes feeding the idea of that myth sometimes challenging it this collection of essays relates to the notion of the traveling essence of the myth of the american west from different geographical and disciplinary standpoints the volume originates in europe in spain where the myth traveled was received assimilated and re presented it intends to travel back to the west in a two way cross cultural journey which will hopefully contribute to the delineation of the new always self renewing american west it includes the work of authors of both sides of the atlantic ocean who propose a cross cultural transdisciplinary dialogue upon the idea the geography and the representation of the american west

over the last twenty years native american literary studies has taken a sharp political turn in this book matthew herman provides the historical framework for this shift and examines the key moments in the movement away from cultural analyses toward more politically inflected and motivated perspectives he highlights such notable cases as the prevailing readings of the popular within native american writing the silko erdrich controversy the ongoing debate over the comparative value of nationalism versus cosmopolitanism within native american literature and politics and the status of native nationalism in relation to recent critiques of the nation coming from postmodernism postcolonialism and subaltern studies herman concludes that the central problematic defining the last two decades of native american literary studies has involved the emergence in theory of anti colonial nationalism its variants and its contradictions this study will be a necessary addition for students and scholars of native american studies as well as 20th century literature

reading the canon explores the relation between the production of literary value and the problem of periodization tracing how literary tastes particular reader communities and sites of literary learning shape the organization of literature in historical perspective rather than suggesting a political critique of the canon this book shows that the production of literary relevance and its tacit hierarchies of value are necessary consequences of how reading and writing are organized as social practices within different fields of literary activity reading the canon offers a comprehensive theoretical account of the conundrums still defining contemporary debates about literary value the book also features a series of historically inflected author studies from classics such as shakespeare and thomas pynchon to less likely figures such as john neal and owen johnson that illustrate how the idea of literary relevance has been appropriated throughout history and across a variety of national and transnational literary institutions

the book explores the discursive and theoretical conditions for conceptualizing the postethnic literary it historicizes us multicultural and postcolonial studies as institutionalized discursive formations which constitute a paratext that regulates the reception of literary texts according to the paradigm of representativeness rather than following that paradigm the study offers an alternative framework by rereading contemporary literary texts for their investment in literary form by means of self reflective intermedial transpositions the writings of sherman alexie chang rae lee and jamaica kincaid insist upon a differentiation between the representation of cultural sign systems or subject positions and the dramatization of individual gestures of authorship as such they form a postethnic literary constellation further probed in the epilogue of the study focused on dave eggers
