this book examines stem change in verb paradigms as in english go go present vs went go past a phenomenon referred to as suppletion in current linguistic theory the work is based on a broad sample of 193 languages and examines this long neglected phenomenon from a typological perspective in addition to identifying types of suppletion which occur cross linguistically the study brings to light areal patterns of the occurrence of suppletive forms in verb paradigms several hypotheses as regards the diachronic development of suppletive forms are presented as well the author also seeks to explore the methodological issues of evaluating the frequency of linguistic features in large language samples by introducing a method of weighting languages according to their genetic relatedness all figures obtained in this way are compared to the proportions yielded by more familiar counting methods and the results and implications of the different procedures are compared and discussed throughout

surprisingly readable and studded with nuggets of insight the daily yomiuri this insightful well written fascinating book offers new understandings not only of japan but also of american culture it is essential for those in anthropology psychology sociology and psychiatry who are interested in culture as well as those in law and the business community who deal with japan paul ekman ph d director human interaction laboratory langley porter institute university of california san francisco a thoughtful cross cultural study of development his work can only enhance the still evolving psychoanalytic theory of preoedipal development as it is being derived mostly from psychoanalytic research on child parent interaction in american families calvin f settlage m d johnson s ambitious and exhaustive synthesis of anthropological and psychological treatments of dependency raises interesting questions johnson alerts the reader to issues of universalism and relativity and leads us to ask what would psychoanalysis be like if it had originated in japan merry i white edwin o reischauer institute of japanese studies harvard university johnson s erudite and critical re examination of human dependence succeeds to re profile dependence meaningfully and revives our interest in this major aspect of human experience indeed much food for thought for both psychoanalysts and anthropologists henri parens m d philadelphia psychoanalytic institute western ideologies traditionally emphasize the concepts of individualism privacy freedom and independence while the prevailing ethos relegates dependency to a disparaged status in japanese society the divergence from these western ideals can be found in the concept of amae perhaps best translated as indulgent dependency which is part of the japanese social fiber and pervades their experience for the western reader the concept of amae is somewhat alien and unfamiliar but in order to understand the japanese fully it is essential to acquire a familiarity with the intensity that accompanies interdependent affiliations within their culture to place amae in the proper context johnson critically examines the western attitudes toward dependency from the perspectives of psychoanalysis psychiatry developmental psychology and anthropology johnson traces the development of the concept and uses of the term dependency in academic and developmental psychology in the west including its recent eclipse by more operationally useful terms attachment and interdependency this timely books makes use of the work of japanese psychiatrist takeo doi whose book the anatomy of dependence introduced the concept of amae to the west johnson goes on to illuminate the collective manner in which japanese think and behave which is central to their

socialization and educational practices especially as seen in the stunning success of japanese trading practices during the past twenty years a major emphasis is placed upon the positive aspects of amae which are compared and contrasted with attitudes toward dependency seen among other nationalities cultures and groups in both western and asian societies complete with a glossary of japanese terms dependency and japanese socialization provides a comprehensive investigation into japanese behavior

harvey may have created a new literary genre science travel writing travelogue autobiography history and even fantasy romp alongside the biology quill quire when biologist brian harvey saw a thousand fish blundering into a brazilian dam he asked the obvious what s going to happen to them the end of the river is the story of his long search for an answer harvey takes readers from a fisheries patrol boat on the fraser river to the great tsukiji fish market in japan with stops in the philippines thailand and assorted south american countries finally in the arid outback of northeast brazil against a backdrop of a multi billion dollar river project nobody seems to want he finds a small scale answer to his simple question in recounting his journey he populates his story with characters both real and imagined human and otherwise a six foot endangered catfish a canadian professor with a weakness for thai bar girls a chain smoking brazilian with a passion for her river a drug addled stick up artist the end of the river is about fishermen fish farmers and fish cops there are scientists and shysters as well as a few colombian narcotraficos and some very drunk very hairy brazilian men in thongs from the founder of the world fisheries trust harvey introduces a new kind of writing about the environment as far off the beaten track as you can get in a land rover driven by a female colombian biologist whose favorite expression is no hay via meaning no road a freewheeling and vividly written essay on the mysteries and longings of what it is to be human in a world of cynicism and loss and more significantly what it is to be hopeful to persevere in the search for redemption and beauty a brilliant and instructive book recalls the travel writing of one of harvey s heroes sir richard burton the globe and mail toronto

this book investigates the lexico grammatical complementarity in language in its construal of person as a semantic system given the vast and wide spectrum of resources for expressing distinctions in the assignment of person roles in language this book presents person related system networks covering a rich range of semantic features it also studies the system of person in relation to other major semantic systems instead of regarding it as one isolated component of language parallel to gender number case etc systemic features of person are in turn realized by lexicogrammar whose components lexis and grammar form a relationship of complementarity in the process of transforming human experience into meaning person related meaning can be either realized by lexical means i e entity process quality or grammatical means i e pronouns clitics affixes zero forms besides such meaning is also found to be realized at some indeterminate areas along the lexis grammar continuum a special feature of this book is that it observes the lexicalization and grammaticalization of person based on evidence from a variety of languages readers will be presented a comprehensive look into the meaning of person and will be encouraged to reflect on its realization in their own languages
