- 3 Choose the Formula Select the appropriate formula to solve the problem Here are some commonly used formulas
 $\text{Speed} = \frac{\text{Distance}}{\text{Time}}$
 $\text{Distance} = \text{Speed} \times \text{Time}$
 $\text{Time} = \frac{\text{Distance}}{\text{Speed}}$

Example 1 Distance and Time Problem A train travels at a constant speed of 80 kilometers per hour How far will it travel in 3 hours
Solution Identify the Rate The problem provides the speed 80 kmh and time 3 hours and asks for the distance Choose the Formula We'll use the formula $\text{Distance} = \text{Speed} \times \text{Time}$ Plug in the Values $\text{Distance} = 80 \text{ kmh} \times 3 \text{ hours}$ Solve for the Unknown $\text{Distance} = 240 \text{ kilometers}$ Check Your Answer The answer makes sense because the train travels at a constant speed and the distance covered is proportional to the time traveled

Example 2 Speed and Distance Problem A car travels 150 miles in 3 hours What is the car's average speed
Solution Identify the Rate The problem provides the distance 150 miles and time 3 hours and asks for the speed Choose the Formula We'll use the formula $\text{Speed} = \frac{\text{Distance}}{\text{Time}}$ Plug in the Values $\text{Speed} = \frac{150 \text{ miles}}{3 \text{ hours}}$ Solve for the Unknown $\text{Speed} = 50 \text{ miles per hour}$ Check Your Answer The answer makes sense because the speed is the distance traveled per unit of time

Example 3 Time and Distance Problem A cyclist rides at a speed of 15 miles per hour How long will it take him to cover 45 miles
Solution Identify the Rate The problem provides the speed 15 mph and distance 45 miles and asks for the time Choose the Formula We'll use the formula $\text{Time} = \frac{\text{Distance}}{\text{Speed}}$ Plug in the Values $\text{Time} = \frac{45 \text{ miles}}{15 \text{ mph}}$ Solve for the Unknown $\text{Time} = 3 \text{ hours}$ Check Your Answer The answer makes sense because the time required is proportional to the distance covered and inversely proportional to the speed
