sirat rasul allah life of the messenger of god or al sirat al nabawiyah prophetic biography is the arabic term used for the various traditional muslim biographies of muhammad from which most historical information about his life and the early period of islam is derived ibn ishaq s

sirat rasul allah is the earliest surviving traditional biography and was written just over 100 years after muhammad s death it survives in the later editions of ibn hisham and al tabari the translator used ibn hisham s abridgement and also included many additions and variants found in the writings of early authors the book thus presents in english practically all that is known of the life of the prophet in the introduction the translator discusses the character of the sira in the light of the opinion of early arabian scholars noting especially the difficulties of the poetry as the earliest monument of arabian prose literature the sira remains a work of the first importance

knowledge of ahadith is essential in an effort to understand islam they contain rules and regulations when implemented would give cause to a better understanding of everyday life this is applicable to the individual of a society and also to the society as a whole the messages within the ahadith are for the benefit of both individual and society among many missions of the prophet peace be upon him one was to set a pattern of conduct the conduct of the last messenger peace be upon him can be found in the voluminous sahihs we should make an attempt to abide by these rules it is unnecessary to mention that research of islam is beyond the scope of a single individual a task unattainable in a man's lifetime not to say impossible to narrow my scope i had decided to restrict myself to ahadith even this is a large area of study within islam i decided on making a small collection of ahadith this decision resulted in a minor project that essentially consisted of reading diverse islamic literature and reading different aspects of islam i could of course have bought one of many voluminous compilations of ahadith but i was convinced that i would learn more by finding and compiling them myself and indeed it has been a most fruitful experience during the compilation i was becoming aware of

the meaning and importance of ahadith and soon realised that others too could benefit from this compilation with this in mind i was determined to share this collection with my fellow muslims all ahadith in this collection have been so to say copied from my source a every hadith is followed by the arabic source it can be found in e g bukhari muslim along with the source i have written it from e g sayings of muhammad by prof ghazi ahmad if the reader feels uncertain about a particular hadith she he can easily trace it to my source all the footnotes in the ahadith are not my insertions but the author s of my sources the titles which are given to the ahadith are also titles found in my source they too are not my insertions the same applies for brackets or found within some ahadith these comments do not apply to the titles marked as introduction and introduction to ahadith the ahadith are all randomly compiled the ahadith have been written down as i have encountered them in relevant literature since i have used different literature there have come cases where two authors use the same title e i marriage hence the title will appear twice this is not to be regarded as a misprint there is no personal preference as to the choice of authors i have obtained them from libraries and the local mosques a problem which was encountered was when two authors wrote on the same subject matter but from different sahihs both sahihs had their own wordings but giving the same meaning i have tried to keep these sort of ahadith to a minimal as i wished to have as many diverse topics as possible faith knowledge marriage sex divorce rights of wives husbands and hospitality are a couple of areas covered in this compilation i have to the very best of my abilities tried to be as careful as possible when writing from the source this in order not to endanger the real meaning of the ahadith nor to give cause to misinterpretations as far as spellings are concerned i have thoroughly checked it the spellings of arabic names and places have been written exactly as i have encountered them in the source one of my sources hayaat ul muslimen written by mohammad ashraf ali thanvi has consistently used the term rasulullah when addressing prophet mohammad peace be upon him the arabic term sallallahu alayhi wasallam has also been used throughout the book for the ease of non muslim readers i have replaced the arabic rasulullah by muhammad and sallallahu alayhi wasallam by may the blessings and peace of allah be upon him i have treated similarly the terms radiallahu anhu and radiallahu anha they have been replaced by allah be pleased with him and allah be pleased with her i have used the term peace be upon him throughout the compilation as most authors have used similar attributes the same author has also mentioned the narrators arabic names for most ahadith i have done likewise

christians had deviated by among other things abandoning animal sacrifice chapter 6 explains how muhammad s religious message included a thinly veiled claim to have the right to political power over mecca a claim that exacerbated tensions with his own clan and led eventually to his expulsion from mecca as recounted in chapter 7 chapters 8 10 describe the impact of the hijra on the evolution of islam seeing himself as the true heir to abraham and the prophets who followed him muhammad would demand allegiance from jews and christians as recounted in sura 2 and other medinan suras he would initiate a war against mecca not in self defense but in order to gain control over the kaaba the central hanif shrine and the new qibla or direction of prayer for the muslims the muslim victory at the battle of badr in 624 would help to shape a new ideal of a militarized religiosity in which those who waged war under muhammad s command would attain the rank of true believers while those converts who refused to make hijra and to fight for muhammad were relegated to the lower rank of mere muslims as suras 8 and 49 make clear muhammad s war against mecca alienated many of his medinan followers the ansar the refusal of the jews to convert to islam combined with the close connection of the jews to the ansar led muhammad to make war on the jews as well as the meccans the surrender of mecca in 630 chapter 11 did not lead to the end of war for the aggressiveness and military success of muhammad s movement had made it attractive to a slew of new converts whose desire for booty had to be placated sura 9 promulgated near the end of muhammad s life served as a broad declaration of war against polytheists jews and christians chapter 12 describes the evolution of islam late in muhammad s life into a religious warriors movement that sought to extend the rule of islam over the entire inhabited world chapter 13 covers the final pilgrimage and death of muhammad while chapters 14 20 describe the development of islamic dogma surrounding the figure of muhammad and its implications for politics in the islamic world and interfaith relations with non muslims up till the present day the book concludes with appendices in which nagel summarizes the state of scholarship regarding the life of muhammad appendix 2 and the tensions between competing varieties of muslim recollection of muhammad appendix 3 muhammad s mission religion politics and power at the birth of islam is an erudite and authoritative guide to events of world historical importance by a scholar who has spent a lifetime mastering the primary sources documenting the birth of islam

the earliest arab histories written in the 7th and 8th centuries by al waqidi al tibri ibn ishaq ibn husham and ibn sa'ad supported by relevant verses of the qur'an are greatly differentiable in length and analyses from the modern islamic propaganda history the islamists teach short purged and grossly exaggerated versions to produce preachers jihadis and propagandists to spread islam however the earliest histories based on hundreds of thousands of meticulously gathered reports of the people of the period and contemporary poetry and prose provide a much more detailed and realistic account from among these earliest records muslim and non muslim scholars agree that ibn husham's d 833 compilation of ibn ishaq's 704-767 ce biography of muhammad is the most complete ibn ishaq travelled widely to collect accounts from those who had witnessed the events or learned about them from muhammad's contemporaries over decades he painstakingly gathered information and wrote it the earliest arab historians portray a picture of muhammad with attributes of an early 7th century arabian leader who adopted the title allah's apostle where in tribal hejaz and najd it was customary to use this title in order to gather support from tribes and people others who used the same title were tulayha ibn khuwaylid ibn noufal of the al asad tribe musaylima ibn habib of the banu hanifa al aswad al ansi of the banu ans sajah bint al harith ibn suayd of the banu taghlib allegedly a scholar named saf ibn sayyad and many others this was because in those days the title allah's apostle embodied the same meaning and status among the arabs as that of a great political leader in modern times because the tribes of these others prophets were not militarily as strong as muhammad's followers were they faced defeat and left him to be the only allah's apostle afterwards historically many kings and leaders attributed their authority to god such as the mughal kings called themselves the light of allah or the shadow of allah the iranian leaders called themselves the sign of allah or the spirit of allah and the ahmadi caliphs use the title the hand of allah these earliest books show that modern islamic propaganda does not reflect the reality of the arab society and culture of muhammad's period there are glaring contradictions between the

earliest arab records and modern islamic myths this book tells the story of muhammad islam the qur an and the arabian society of the period as truthfully and originally as the available records make it possible this edition of the book includes its urdu translation alongside the original english version
