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the first book to attempt to provide a framework for analyzing disability through the ages henri jacques stiker s now classic a history of disability traces the history of western cultural responses to disability from ancient times to the present the sweep of the volume is broad from a rereading and reinterpretation of the oedipus myth to legislation regarding disability stiker proposes an analytical history that demonstrates how societies reveal themselves

through their attitudes towards disability in unexpected ways through this history stiker examines a fundamental issue in contemporary western discourse on disability the cultural assumption that equality sameness similarity is always desired by those in society he highlights the consequences of such a mindset illustrating the intolerance of diversity and individualism that arises from placing such importance on equality working against this thinking stiker argues that difference is not only acceptable but that it is desirable and necessary this new edition of the classic volume features a new foreword by david t mitchell and sharon I snyder that assesses the impact of stiker s history on disability studies and beyond twenty years after the book s translation into english the book will be of interest to scholars of disability historians social scientists cultural anthropologists and those who are intrigued by the role that culture plays in the development of language and thought surrounding people with disabilities

the oxford handbook of disability history features twenty seven articles that span the diverse global history of the disabled from antiquity to today

the routledge history of disability explores the shifting attitudes towards and representations of disabled people from the age of antiquity to the twenty first century taking an international view of the subject this wide ranging collection shows that the history of disability cuts across racial ethnic religious cultural gender and class divides highlighting the commonalities and differences between the experiences of disabled persons in global historical context the book is arranged in four parts covering histories of disabilities across various time periods and cultures histories of national disability policies programs and services histories of education and training and the ways in which disabled people have been seen and treated in the last few decades within this the twenty eight chapters discuss topics such as developments in disability issues during the late ottoman period the history of disability in belgian congo in the early twentieth century blind asylums in nineteenth century scotland and the systematic killing of disabled children in nazi germany illustrated with images and tables and providing an overview of how various countries cultures and societies have addressed disability over time this comprehensive volume offers a global perspective on this rapidly growing field and is a valuable resource for scholars of disability studies and histories of disabilities

disability history exists outside of the institutions healers and treatments it often brings to mind it is a history where disabled people live not just as patients or cure seekers but rather as people living differently in the world and it is also a history that helps define the fundamental concepts of identity community citizenship and normality the oxford handbook of disability history is the first volume of its kind to represent this history and its global scale from ancient greece to british west africa the twenty seven articles written by thirty experts from across the field capture the diversity and liveliness of this emerging scholarship whether discussing disability in modern chinese cinema or on the american antebellum stage this collection provides new and valuable insights into the rich and varied lives of disabled people across time and place

in their chronological portrait the authors synthesize the many voices of exceptional children providing a historical picture that includes not only the perspective of the professional but also to the extent possible that of the client the book begins by placing the origins of special education in historical context from aristotle through the enlightenment and beyond subsequent chapters consider individual conditions traditionally associated with specialized approaches e g blindness deafness and retardation discuss conditions that have given rise to further differentiation of childhood exceptionality and offer a synthesis of themes and a prospective for a new history now emerging of children considered exceptional

throughout history numerous individuals with disabilities have had to pit themselves against huge obstacles placed in their way because of the type of person they were born as the type of person they became through accident illness or circumstances or the type of person they have been perceived as this book tells the story of how disabled people have done this how they have seen themselves how they have been perceived and treated by others and how they have influenced society people with disabilities have always been a part of english society and this concise thousand year history ranges from the surprisingly integrated communities of the medieval and early modern periods to the institutionalisation of the 19th

and 20th centuries sometimes the history of disability is described as a hidden history this book argues that it is no such thing the history of people with disabilities is often in front of our eyes yet we frequently choose to ignore it or simply do not see it accounts of daily life events art literature family histories and political debate have always featured people with disabilities who are there for all to see but too often observers particularly non disabled observers gaze straight past them

collecting together essays written by an international set of contributors this book provides an important contribution to the emerging field of disability history it explores changes in understandings of deformity and disability between the sixteenth and twentieth centuries and reveal the ways in which different societies have conceptualised the normal and the pathological through a variety of case studies including early modern birth defects homosexuality smallpox scarring vaccination orthopaedics deaf education eugenics mental deficiency and the experiences of psychologically scarred military veterans this book provides new perspectives on the history of physical sensory and intellectual anomaly examining changes over five centuries it charts how disability was delineated from other forms of deformity and disfigurement by a clearer medical perspective essays shed light on the experiences of oppressed minorities often hidden from mainstream history but also demonstrate the importance of discourses of disability and deformity as key cultural signifiers which disclose broader systems of power and authority citizenship and exclusion the diverse nature of the material in this book will make it relevant to scholars interested in cultural literary social and political as well as medical history
