scan the text to get a sense of its structure headings and overall theme Question Formulate questions about what you expect to learn This will set you up for active reading and help you focus Read Carefully read the text highlighting key points and making notes in the margins Recite Summarize the main ideas in your own words either verbally or by writing brief notes Review Revisit your notes and connections youve made 2 Marginalia Master Dont be afraid to directly engage with the text Use the margins for Highlighting Mark important passages key vocabulary or unfamiliar concepts Annotations Write brief summaries questions or connections to other parts of the text Crossreferences Note connections between different sections of the text or to other texts youve read 3 The Cornell NoteTaking System This method is excellent for organizing information and for later review Divide your page Create a main section for notes and a smaller section for key terms or questions Record notes Take detailed notes in the main section during your reading Cue column After reading summarize key points or questions in the cue column Write a concise summary of the entire text at the bottom of the page 4 Digital NoteTaking Tools For a more dynamic experience explore apps like Evernote Great for organizing and syncing notes across devices Notion Offers a flexible and customizable platform for notetaking and project management Google Docs For quick and easy notetaking with collaborative features 5 Mind Mapping Visual learners rejoice Mind maps allow you to capture information in a structured and visually appealing way 3 Central idea Start with the main theme of the text in the center of your page Branches Develop branches from the center connecting related concepts definitions and key figures Colors and symbols Use different colors and symbols to highlight important details Decoding Medieval and Early Modern Language Now lets address the language barrier that often arises when reading historical texts Medieval and early modern English can be a real puzzle Get familiar with archaic words Use a dictionary or online resources specifically for historical language Pay attention to context Clues to word meanings can often be found within the surrounding sentences Look for patterns Some words like thou and thee are common in older texts Dont
