the painted panel and shroud portraits of roman egypt constitute the only corpus of coloured images of individuals to survive from classical antiquity many are of outstanding artistic quality and as a whole they reflect a range of techniques

the mummy portraits of roman egypt are haunting images of ancient faces anonymous people painted by anonymous artists and yet they are historical and cultural documents of outstanding interest and importance and many are of superb artistic quality this type of portrait appeared in egypt in the first century ad and remained popular for around 200 years though the subjects believed in the traditional egyptian cults which offered them a firm prospect of life after death they also wished to be commemorated in the roman manner portraits were commissioned that would serve as a realistic record of the deceased as he or she had appeared in life these were painted on a wooden board at a roughly lifelike scale which was then placed on the outside of the cartonnage coffin over the head of the individual or carefully placed into the mummy wrappings the images also reveal the adoption of roman fashions in dress and personal adornment by persons remote from the centre of the empire but likely to have been actively engaged in its local administration by careful assessment of the hairstyles clothes and jewellery it is possible to date the portraits often within a decade or so many of the finest and best known examples come from the fayum and are a dazzling testament to the greek painting tradition in particular the sophistication of the alexandrian school from which they are derived it is not until some fifteen centuries later in the faces painted by titian or rembrandt's depiction of his own features as he saw them reflected in a mirror that the same artistry that characterizes many of the anonymous painters of the fayum is witnessed again

in the first three centuries ad in a fertile district of roman egypt called the fayum a diverse community of greeks egyptians romans syrians libyans nubians and jews flourished these people and many of their contemporaries throughout the Nile valley embalmed the bodies of their dead and then placed over the faces portraits painted on wooden panels or linen these paintings today known as fayum or mummy portraits were created to preserve the memory of each individual the fayum portraits are by far the most important body of portraiture to have survived antiquity reproduced in this arresting book are some 180 of the finest of the more than 1 000 extant images of men women and children young and old plain and beautiful all of whom seem uncannily alive a few of these faces have become familiar to scholars and museum goers but as a whole they have been neglected by art historians and will be new to most readers

this publication presents fascinating new findings on ancient romano egyptian funerary portraits preserved in international collections once interred with mummified remains nearly a thousand funerary portraits from roman egypt survive

these extraordinary egyptian images produced from julio claudian times through the age of constantine the first four centuries ad seem often to have been commissioned while the subject was still alive and displayed in the home at death the portrait was inserted into the deceased's mummy wrappings thirteen mummy portraits from the getty museum's collection are catalogued in this text by dr david thompson professor of classics at howard university placing the works in the context of other so called fayum paintings dr thompson examines their importance as portraits and identifies the hands of individual painters numerous illustrations accompany his discussion

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in Egypt of the 1st century AD an alternative was introduced to the traditional use of painted masks of papier mache on wrapped and decorated mummies a new technique borrowed from the Hellenic tradition of painting in encaustic coloured wax or water colour on wooden panels or linen sheets involved the production of realistic images of the faces of men women and children these idealized paintings were placed over the face of the wrapped mummy the combination of an impressionistically rendered face and a wrapped mummiform body has been interpreted as a synthesis of two contrasting contemporary cultures Hellenic and native Egyptian however Corcoran's analysis of the iconography of these mummies reveals that their decoration reflects the continuity of a cultural alignment that was fundamentally Egyptian her study documents a vital and articulate pagan tradition that survived in Egypt until the triumph of Christianity in the fourth century AD written from the perspective of an academic Egyptologist this analysis of an important corpus of objects includes an illustrated catalogue of 23 mummy coverings with portrait faces from the collections of museums in Egypt both as an original work on quite inaccessible material and as an important scholarly study of a class of artefact usually treated more glossily this will be an important book for Egyptologists classicists art historians and historians of religion

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
