the liberal arts are dying they are dying because most americans don t see the point of them americans don t understand why anyone would study literature or history or the classics or more contemporarily feminist criticism whiteness studies or the literature of postcolonial states when they can get an engineering or business degree even more concerning is when they read how western civilization has become a term of reproach at so many supposedly thoughtful institutions or how

fanatical political correctness works hard to silence alternative viewpoints or more generally how liberal studies have become scattered narrow and small in this atmosphere it's hard to convince parents or their progeny that a liberal education is all that wonderful or that it's even worthy of respect over sixty years ago we were introduced to the idea of the two cultures in higher education that is the growing rift in the academy between the humanities and the sciences a rift wherein neither side understood the other spoke to the other or cared for the other but this divide in the academy real as it may be is nothing compared to another great divide the rift today between our common american culture and the culture of the academy itself so how can we rebuild the notion that a liberal education is truly of value both to our students and to the nation our highest hopes may be not to restore the liberal arts to what they looked like fifty or a hundred years ago but to ask ourselves what a true contemporary american liberal education at its best might look like remedying this situation will involve knowing clearly where we wish to go and then understanding how we might get there for those objectives this book is meant to be the beginning

private liberal arts colleges are among the oldest of american institutions yet their history has been surrounded by concern about their ability to survive some see these small colleges as increasingly irrelevant in a world marked by growing demand for technical training others wonder how private colleges many with few students and high tuitions can compete successfully against heavily subsidized public colleges and universities david breneman an economist and former college president confronts the renewed concern about the future of liberal arts colleges he explains that as higher education emerged from the relatively expansive years of the 1980s into the economically distressed 1990s many college administrators faced and continue to face great uncertainty about enrollment and funding can these small labor intensive colleges thrive or will they wither will families be able and willing to pay the costs required for this type of education will the drift toward technical and professional studies doom colleges devoted to seemingly less practical study of the arts and sciences in this book breneman explores these and many other educational and economic issues he provides a detailed analysis of more than 200 liberal arts colleges and describes the recent financial and curricular history of many of these schools he explains how they have survived and how many have prospered despite severe competitive pressures breneman shows why the universe of liberal arts colleges which includes such members as women's colleges black colleges religiously affiliated colleges and highly selective colleges have had diverse experiences and confront different futures liberal arts colleges includes sketches of twelve colleges that provide insight into both the shared and distinctive concerns of a varied but representative set of liberal arts colleges the author weaves these specific cases into a final chapter on the prospects for liberal arts colleges and concludes that some colleges are thriving most colleges have survived and only a few are endangered book jacket title summary field provided by blackwell north america inc all rights reserved

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empirical evidence for the value of a liberal arts education how and why it has a lasting impact on success leadership altruism learning and fulfillment in ongoing debates over the value of a college education the role of the liberal arts in higher education has been blamed by some for making college expensive impractical and even worthless defenders argue that liberal arts education makes society innovative creative and civic minded but these qualities are hard to quantify and many critics of higher education call for courses of study to be strictly job specific in this groundbreaking book richard detweiler drawing on interviews with more than 1 000 college graduates aged 25 to 65 offers

empirical evidence for the value of a liberal arts education detweiler finds that a liberal arts education has a lasting impact on success leadership altruism learning and fulfillment over a lifetime unlike other defenders of a liberal arts education detweiler doesn't rely on philosophical arguments or anecdotes but on data he developed a series of interview questions related to the content attributes of liberal arts for example course assignments and majors the context attributes out of class interaction with faculty and students teaching methods campus life and the purpose attributes adult life outcomes interview responses show that although both the content of study and the educational context are associated with significant life outcomes the content of study has less relationship to positive adult life outcomes than the educational context the implications of this research detweiler points out range from the advantages of broadening areas of study to factors that could influence students' decisions to attend certain colleges
