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purpose of the study interwoven with the fabric of our english literature of our epics dramas lyrics and novels of our essays and orations like a golden warp where the woof is only too often of silver are the myths of certain ancient nations it is the purpose of this work to relate some of these myths and to illustrate the uses to which they have been put in english literature and incidentally in art the fable and the myth careful discrimination must be made between the fable and the myth a fable is a story like that of king log or the fox and the grapes in which characters and plot neither pretending to reality nor demanding credence are fabricated confessedly as the vehicle of moral or didactic instruction dr johnson narrows still further the scope of the fable it seems to be in its genuine state a narrative in which beings irrational and sometimes inanimate are for the purpose of moral instruction feigned to act and speak with human interests and passions myths on the other hand are stories of anonymous origin prevalent among primitive peoples and by them accepted as true concerning supernatural beings and events or natural beings and events influenced by supernatural agencies fables are made by individuals they may be told in any stage of a nation s history Ñby a jotham when the israelites were still under the judges 1200 years before christ or by christ himself in the days of the most critical jewish scholarship by a menenius when rome was still involved in petty squabbles of plebeians and patricians or by ph³/₄drus and horace in the augustan age of roman imperialism and roman letters by an sop well nigh fabulous to fabled fellow slaves and athenian tyrants or by la fontaine to the grand monarch and the most highly civilized race of seventeenth century europe fables are vessels made to order into which a lesson may be poured myths are born not made they are born in the infancy of a people they owe their features not to any one historic individual

but to the imaginative efforts of generations of story tellers the myth of pandora the first woman endowed by the immortals with heavenly graces and of prometheus who stole fire from heaven for the use of man the myth of the earthborn giants that in the beginning contested with the gods the sovereignty of the universe of the moon goddess who with her buskined nymphs pursues the chase across the azure of the heavens or descending to earth cherishes the youth endymion Ñthese myths germinating in some quaint and childish interpretation of natural events or in some fireside fancy have put forth unconsciously under the nurture of the simple folk that conceived and tended them luxuriant branches and leaves of narrative and blossoms of poetic comeliness and form the myths that we shall relate present wonderful accounts of the creation histories of numerous divine beings adventures of heroes in which magical and ghostly agencies play a part and where animals and inanimate nature don the attributes of men and gods many of these myths treat of divinities once worshiped by the greeks and the romans and by our norse and german forefathers in the dark ages myths more or less like these may be found in the literatures of nearly all nations many are in the memories and mouths of savage races at this time existent but the stories here narrated are no longer believed by any one the so called divinities of olympus and of asgard have not a single worshiper among men they dwell only in the realm of memory and imagination they are enthroned in the palace of art

eleni pachoumi looks at the concepts of the divine in the greek magical papyri by way of a careful and detailed analysis of ritual practices and spells her aim is to uncover the underlying religious philosophical and mystical parallelisms and influences on the greek magical papyri she starts by examining the religious and philosophical concept of the personal daimon and the union of the individual with his personal daimon through the magico theurgic ritual of systasis she then goes on to analyze the religious concept of paredros as the divine assistant and the various relationships between paredros the divine and the individual to round off she studies the concept of the divine through the manifold religious and philosophical assimilations mainly between greek egyptian hellenized gods and divine abstract concepts of jewish origins

mary blachford tighe was born in dublin in 1772 and became a poet by the age of seventeen her enormously popular 1805 epic poem psyche or the legend of love

made her a fixture of English literary history for much of the nineteenth century for much of the twentieth century however Tighe was better known for her influence on Keats's poetry than the considerable merits of her own work the collected poems and journals of Mary Tighe restores Tighe to the general canon of English literature of the period with over eighty-five poems including the complete *Psyche* and extracts from several journals both by and about Tighe Harriet Kramer Linkin's annotated edition is the most complete collection of Mary Tighe's work to be published in one volume

The Routledge Companion to Romantic Women Writers overviews critical reception for Romantic women writers from their earliest periodical reviews through the most current scholarship and directs users to avenues of future research it is divided into two parts the first section offers topical discussions on the status of provincial poets on women's engagement in children's literature the relation of women writers to their religious backgrounds the historical backgrounds to women's orientalism and their engagement in debates on slavery and abolition the second part surveys the life and careers of individual women some 47 in all with sections for biography biographical resources works modern editions archival holdings critical reception and avenues for further research the final sections of each essay offer further guidance for researchers including signatures under which the author published and a list of works accompanied whenever possible with contemporary prices and publishing formats to facilitate research a robust works cited includes all texts mentioned or quoted in the essay

The selections from 132 authors in this anthology represent gender social class and racial and national origin as inclusively as possible providing both greater context for canonical works and a sense of the era's richness and diversity in terms of genre poetry non-fiction prose philosophy educational writing and prose fiction are included geographically America Canada Australia India and Africa are represented along with Britain emphasizing Romantic literature as a world literature biographical headnotes explanatory footnotes and an extensive bibliography clarify and illuminate the texts for readers

The notion of an infernal place of punishment for undesired elements in human culture and human nature has a long history both as religious idea and as cultural metaphor this book brings together a wide array of scholars who examine hell as an idea within the Christian tradition and its afterlife in historical and contemporary

imagination leading scholars grapple with the construction and meaning of hell in the past and investigate its modern utility as a means to describe what is perceived as horrific or undesirable in modern culture while the idea of an infernal region of punishment was largely developed in the context of early jewish and christian religious culture it remains a central belief for some christians in the modern world hell s reception its afterlife in the modern world has extended hell s meaning beyond the religious realm hell has become a pervasive image and metaphor in political rhetoric in popular culture and in the media bringing together scholars from a variety of fields to contribute to a wider understanding of this fascinating and important cultural idea this book will appeal to readers from historical religious literary and cultural perspectives

in this book the first full length study of its kind in english marsha morton argues that no artist represented the shift from tradition to innovation in the wilhelmine empire 1870s 1880s more compellingly than max klinger morton makes an interdisciplinary examination of klinger s early prints and drawings within the context of wilhelmine transformations coming to the conclusion that the artist s work revealed the psychological and biological underpinnings of modern rational man whose drives and passions undermined bourgeois constructions of society

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
