metaphors similes rhetorical questions and explain their impact on the reader Consider the writers purpose and how language choices contribute to this Compare and contrast questions These require you to identify both similarities and differences between the two texts in Section B Structure your response clearly perhaps using a comparative paragraph structure to address similarities and differences in turn always linking back to specific evidence within the texts Evaluate questions These test your ability to make judgements about the effectiveness of the writers techniques Consider the overall impact of the text and whether the writer achieves their purpose Support your judgments with concrete textual evidence
