Similarly, work by Dr. Mary Main and colleagues on the Adult Attachment Interview has shown how parents' own attachment history impacts their parenting styles and consequently their children's attachment security. These challenges aren't simply behavioral issues; they stem from a deep-seated emotional need for connection and safety. Children with insecure attachment struggle to feel safe and
