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the methods by which a student becomes a speech and language therapist have developed since the 1970s and have been influenced by different models of higher and professional education although it is comparatively easy to change an aspect of course content for example to increase the number of learning hours on autism the means by which the student learns to become a competent professional in practice are more complex this text discusses some of the exciting ways we are examining issues in professional education it covers actual content for example the introduction of dysphagia to the curriculum new methods for learning problem based learning and information technology developments how speech and language therapists develop competence and what is critical in the transition to becoming a qualified therapist the longstanding placement problem is addressed by innovative work using different professional learning models such as peer placements and school based placements the reader is provided with detailed practical advice about how to approach these models the book represents some of the current work in universities and speech and language services in the uk and reveals the creativity and commitment to an expanding subject area

now in its second edition speech and language therapy the decision making process when working with children reveals how recent research and changes in health and education services have affected the decision making process in the assessment and management of children with speech and language problems with individual chapters written by experts in their field this book illustrates how the decisions made by practitioners may vary within different work settings shows how these decisions may need to be adapted when working with specific client groups explores how such decisions are part of effective evidence based practice offers an overview of the skills required by the developing professional provides insight into working as a newly qualified therapist in the current job market rigorously underpinned with current research and revised legislation this is an important textbook for speech and language therapy students potential

speech language therapy as a global practice focuses on the necessary skills and considerations needed to be a culturally responsive clinician in a multicultural and multilingual world the book highlights current issues of global practice and advocates for appropriate ways to engage with global communities it positions culture context and collaboration as integral and intertwined components of speech language therapy work drawing on examples of successful and ongoing collaborative global speech language therapy partnerships chapters cover a breadth of topics including social justice translanguaging and colourism and include a series of reflective questions authors grapple with ways to challenge the status quo and consider alternative ways of being knowing and doing including the use of technology and innovation in global practice overall this collection highlights the importance of creating space for discussion as the profession of speech language therapy is now practiced in more countries than ever before this much needed book will be essential reading for students and practising speech language therapists particularly those interested in cultural competence meaningful reflection and ethical practice it will also be of interest to allied health professionals working with individuals experiencing communication disability

with particular focus on creating a more inclusive professional community each section concludes with a space for reflection and action planning to guide the reader through their own journey of understanding how to use mentoring to unlock their own professional development needs this resource is relevant for all speech and language therapists those embarking on a new career in speech and language therapy those needing guidance at a career crossroads leaders looking to develop a workforce and those wishing to diversify their communication skills to support their colleagues

this book covers the anatomy physiology and neuroscience relevant to the practice of speech and language therapy it does so in sufficient detail to equip students with an understanding of the relevance of basic medical sciences to the clinical components of their courses an overview of the major body systems and an outline of the structure and function of cells and pertinent tissues of the body is followed by more detailed descriptions of the structure and function of the nervous system the respiratory system the phonatory and articular apparatus and the ear their role in normal and abnormal speech and language is illustrated by clinical examples likely to be met in practice the book will also act as a useful resource for experienced practitioners who wish to refresh or extend their knowledge of those basic sciences relevant to their specialities or as a prelude to undertaking specialised in service study courses

with this practical resource speech and language therapy students and practitioners will discover how to link classroom theories and methods to standards attitudes and behaviors that will help them ensure success in clinical practice the text leads students and professionals from coursework to practice with guidance on intervention assessment therapy interaction with family members and staff work in various settings maintenance of records and written reports the authors also reveal the prerequisite skills and aptitude and the understanding of practice that individuals need to perform successfully as speech language therapy clinicians the combination of ideas case illustrations and concepts offers direction and support to students as they embark on their professional careers experienced clinicians and professionals returning to the field after an absence will also find this

this text promotes the view that the clinical education process offers both clinical educators and students opportunities for personal and professional development it guides the reader through the clinical education process from pre placement preparation to assessment of learning that supports and encourages personal and professional development included are resources for supporting the clinical education process such as checklists case studies and proformas and vignettes illustrate the richness of students and clinical educators learning experiences

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
