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beneath the mask presents classic theories of human nature much as each theorist

might if the theorist were to teach his or her ideas to people encountering them for the first time through a theorist by theorist approach this eighth edition continues to explore the ideas of personality theorists developmentally incorporating the personal origins of ideas to illuminate links between the psychology of each theorist and that theorist's own psychology of persons beneath the mask presents the sequence of thinking for more than 20 theorists and demonstrates how the thinking that led to major theories is nested in the life experience of the theorists within the context of the surrounding culture the authors emphasize each theorist's life history as the basis for the ideas that constitute his or her theories making them easier to understand as pictures of human nature john p wilson has revised the text in a manner that preserves and improves upon the best features of the late robert n sollod and christopher monte's work

because mask improvisation work is relatively new in american theater training this book is designed not only to acquaint readers with the theory of mask improvisation but to instruct them in the techniques of method as well featuring dozens of improvisational exercises in the innovative spirit of viola spolin and supplemented with practical appendices on mask design and construction forms and checklists and other classroom materials this book is an invaluable tool for teacher and student alike as well as compelling reading for anyone interested in acquiring a deeper understanding of masks as agents of transformation creativity and performance

no study of modern theater is complete without a thorough understanding of the enormous influence of visionary genius edward gordon craig born in england in 1872 craig went on to become famous world wide as an actor manager director playwright designer and most importantly an author and theorist whose books were translated into german russian japanese dutch hungarian and danish although an essential parallel to the european avant garde craig was often read as exceptional and highly innovative in his native britain thus the mask not only appears as craig's main cosmopolitan project but also at times functions as a surrogate stage for his experiments in theater practice the book has a comprehensive chronology extensive notes and a bibliography making it an essential text for undergraduates postgraduates actors theatre professionals designers directors researchers and writers in the fields of theatre studies especially theater set and lighting and theater history

this volume looks at masking and unmasking as indivisible aspects of the same process it gathers articles from a wide range of disciplines and addresses unmasking both as a historical and a contemporary phenomenon by highlighting the performative dimensions of unmasking it challenges dichotomies like depth and surface authenticity and deception that play a central role in masks being commonly associated with illusion and dissimulation the contributions explore topics such as the relationship between face mask and identity in artistic contexts

-ranging from surrealist photography to video installations and from modernist poetry to fin de siècle cabaret theater they investigate un masking as a process of transition and transformation be it in the case of the wooden masks of the first nations of the american northwest coast or of the elaborate costumes and vocal masking of pop icon lady gaga in all of these instances the act of un masking has the power to simultaneously hide and reveal it destabilizes supposedly fixed identities and blurs the lines between the self and the other the visible and the invisible the volume offers new perspectives on current debates surrounding issues such as protective masks in public spaces facial recognition technologies and colonial legacies in monuments and museums offering insight into what the act of un masking can mean today with contributions by laurette burgholzer joyce cheng sarah hegenbart bethan hughes judith kemp christiane lewe w anthony sheppard bernhard siegert anja wächter and eleonore zapf

the simple fabric face mask is a key agent in the fight against the global spread of covid 19 however beyond its role as a protective covering against coronavirus infection the face mask is the bearer of powerful symbolic and political power and arouses intense emotions adopting an international perspective informed by social theory the face mask in covid times a sociomaterial analysis offers an intriguing and original investigation of the social cultural and historical dimensions of face masking as a practice in the age of covid rather than beck s risk society we are now living in a covid society the long term effects of which have yet to be experienced or imagined everything has changed the covid crisis has generated novel forms of sociality and new ways of living and moving through space and time in this new world the face mask has become a significant object positioned as one of the key ways people can protect themselves and others from infection with the coronavirus the face mask is rich with symbolic meaning as well as practical value in the words of theorist jane bennett the face mask has acquired a new thing power as it is coming together with human bodies in these times of uncertainty illness and death the role of the face mask in covid times has been the subject of debate and dissension arousing strong feelings the historical and cultural contexts in which face masks against covid contagion are worn or not worn are important to consider in some countries such as japan and other east asian nations face mask wearing has a long tradition full or partial facial coverings such as veiling is common practice in regions such as the middle east in many other countries including most countries in the global north most people beyond health care workers have little or no experience of face masks they have had to learn how to make sense of face masking as a protective practice and how to incorporate face masks into their everyday practices and routines face masking practices have become highly political the usa has witnessed protests against face mask wearing that rest on sovereign individualism a notion which is highly specific to the contemporary political climate in that country face masks have also been worn to make political statements bearing anti racist statements for example but also trump campaign support meanwhile celebrities and influencers have sought to

advocate for face mask wearing as part of their branding while art makers museums designers and novelty fashion manufacturers have identified the opportunity to profit from this sudden new market face masks have become a fashion item as well as a medical device both a way of signifying the wearer's individuality and beliefs and their ethical stance in relation to the need to protect their own and others health the face mask in covid times a sociomaterial analysis provides a short and accessible analysis of the sociomaterial dimensions of the face mask in the age of covid 19 the book presents seven short chapters and an epilogue we bring together sociomaterial theoretical perspectives with compelling examples from public health advice and campaigns anti mask activism as well as popular culture news reports blog posts videos online shopping sites art works to illustrate our theoretical points and use images to support our analysis

nineteenth century writer alexandre dumas 1802 1870 author of the three musketeers and the count of monte cristo has been a controversial part of the french patrimony and faced various forms of racial prejudice in france because of his biracial ancestry and due to being a descendant of a slave during the late nineteenth century the rise of scientific racism and aggressive european imperialism resulted in worldviews supporting european superiority and equated european with being white such developments complicated perceptions of dumas as part of the french patrimony french intellectuals and politicians from the late nineteenth century onward created their own imaginative visions of what dumas had represented in order to employ them ideologically to support or counter prevailing mainstream views of french history and identity this collection traces the evolution of dumas's legacy as a controversial symbol of france since 1870 as the nation has struggled to deal with colonialism and its aftermath and increased diversity and globalization
