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consistent with international trends there is an active pursuit of more engaging science education in the asia pacific region the aim of this book is to bring together some examples of research being undertaken at a range of levels from studies of curriculum and assessment tools to classroom case studies and investigations into models of teacher professional learning and development while neither a comprehensive nor definitive representation of the work that is being carried out in the region the contributions from china hong kong taiwan korea japan singapore australia and new zealand give a taste of some of the issues
