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ebony is the flagship magazine of johnson publishing founded in 1945 by john h johnson it still maintains the highest global circulation of any african american focused magazine

there are many issues that affect the african american community that are not being addressed adequately for a

long time now many african american people have been under the impression or made to feel that they are helpless and need to depend on someone on the outside to help them rebuild their communities of course this is not true no one from the outside is coming to help rebuild a community in which they do not live it is time for us as black people or african americans in this country to take responsibility for our own neighborhoods and our own schools and our own economics and our own future for us to thrive as a community and prosper we must figure out the answers to these questions and understand why we do not force ourselves to live up to our full potential it is up to us and only us to better our situations and rebuild our communities

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deindustrialization white flight and inner city poverty have spelled trouble for baltimore schools marion orr now examines why school reform has been difficult to achieve there revealing the struggles of civic leaders and the limitations placed on baltimore s african american community as each has tried to rescue a failing school system examining the interplay between government and society orr presents the first systematic analysis of social capital both within the african american community black social capital and outside it where social capital crosses racial lines orr shows that while black social capital may have created solidarity against white domination in baltimore it hampered african american leaders capacity to enlist the cooperation from white corporate elites and suburban residents needed for school reform orr examines social capital at the neighborhood level in elite level interactions and in intergovernmental relations to argue that black social capital doesn t necessarily translate into the kind of intergroup coalition needed to bring about school reform he also includes an extensive historical survey of the black community showing how distrust engendered by past black experiences has hampered the formation of significant intergroup social capital the book features case studies of school reform activity including the first analysis of the politics surrounding baltimore s decision to hire a private for profit firm to operate nine of its public schools these cases illuminate the paradoxical aspects of black social capital in citywide school reform while offering critical perspectives on current debates about privatization site based management and other reform alternatives orr s book challenges those who argue that social capital alone can solve fundamentally political problems by purely social

means and questions the efficacy of either privatization or black community power to reform urban schools black social capital offers a cogent conceptual synthesis of social capital theory and urban regime theory that demonstrates the importance of government politics and leadership in converting social capital into a resource that can be mobilized for effective social change

biographical and bibliographical entries on some 400 black authors active in the 20th century some of the sketches are updated from gale's contemporary authors series others were written especially for this volume covers not only contemporary american authors but also earlier 20th century writers social figures e.g. malcolm x desmond tutu and important african and caribbean writers in addition to the descriptive personal and career information there are illuminating biographical critical essays including comments often by the authors themselves on personal interests aspirations motivations and thoughts on writing annotation copyrighted by book news inc portland or

in early twentieth century motion picture houses offensive stereotypes of african americans were as predictable as they were prevalent watermelon eating chicken thievery savages with uncontrollable appetites sambo and zip coon were all representations associated with african american people most of these caricatures were rendered by whites in blackface few people realize that from 1915 through 1929 a number of african american film directors worked diligently to counter such racist definitions of black manhood found in films like d.w. griffith's the birth of a nation the 1915 epic that glorified the ku klux klan in the wake of the film's phenomenal success african american filmmakers sought to defend and redefine black manhood through motion pictures gerald butters's comprehensive study of the african american cinematic vision in silent film concentrates on works largely ignored by most contemporary film scholars african american produced and directed films and white independent productions of all black features using these race movies to explore the construction of masculine identity and the use of race in popular culture he separates cinematic myth from historical reality the myth of the euro american controlled cinematic portrayal of black men versus the actual black male experience through intense archival research butters reconstructs many lost films expanding the discussion of race and representation beyond the debate about good and bad imagery to

explore the construction of masculine identity and the use of race as device in the context of western popular culture he particularly examines the filmmaking of oscar Micheaux the most prolific and controversial of all african american silent film directors and creator of the recently rediscovered *Within Our Gates* the legendary film that exposed a virtual litany of white abuses toward blacks black manhood on the silent screen is unique in that it takes contemporary and original film theory applies it to the distinctive body of african american independent films in the silent era and relates the meaning of these films to larger political social and intellectual events in american society by showing how both white and black men have defined their own sense of manhood through cinema it examines the intersection of race and gender in the movies and offers a deft interweaving of film theory american history and film history

although the behavior patterns of these thirteen superachievers are consistent with his findings on nonblacks Landrum concludes the book with ten cultural differences in the ways blacks and nonblacks approach creativity and innovation among these cultural factors was the fact that these thirteen black subjects were far better educated than the white subjects
