Born and raised in china and now a distinguished professor at michigan state university, zhao bases many of his observations on firsthand experience as a student in china and as a parent of children attending school in the united states. His unique perspective leads him to conclude that american education is at a crossroads and we need to change course to maintain leadership in a rapidly changing world. To make his case, zhao explains what's right with american education, why much of the criticism of schools in the united states has been misleading and misinformed, why china and other nations in asia are actually reforming their systems to be more like their american counterparts, how globalization and the death of distance are affecting jobs and everyday life, and how the virtual world is transforming the economic and social landscape in ways far more profound than many people realize. Educators, policymakers, parents, and others interested in preparing students to be productive global citizens will gain a clear understanding of what kinds of knowledge and skills constitute digital competence and global competence and what schools can and must do to meet the challenges and opportunities brought about by globalization and technology.

This book investigates from a sociocultural, linguistic, and pedagogical perspective the conceptual and pragmatic frameworks that characterize secondary language learning in a northeast asian context. Volume 9 takes up the questions national sociolinguistic, strategic, economic, and educational which arise in relation to the increasing use of english alongside national or vernacular languages, focusing on its use as the language of instruction in danish universities. Inevitably, this also makes globalisation a theme of this issue. The dilemmas of the universities, however, have a special character within this wider issue, partly because they are in the frontline of globalisation processes and partly because they are regarded as having new and enhanced social significance in the post-industrial society. In addition to the academic articles in this issue, there is a series of position statements written by some of the major participants in the danish debate on language policy in the universities. They were invited to state in about 500 words their essential views on the theme. Their contributions give some of the flavour of the argument that has been going on with increasing intensity in denmark for the past ten years.

Experts in this diverse and complex field present an up-to-date picture of thinking on internationalisation and its impact on chinese and western institutions.
