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ancient fables have come down to us in many forms they were published as fable collections both in prose and verse or embedded in literary works of other genres the contributions to this volume shed light on the interaction between fables and these literary genres and give an overview of fables from early greek to medieval literature they seek to ask what role fables play in individual genres and which genres in turn find an echo in fables in the case of fables embedded in other genres the contributions ask as to which fables are chosen for which theme or genre and how they relate to it how fables are adapted in other texts how these embeddings are marked at a textual level and what purpose they serve in the case of other genres influencing fable collections the volume illustrates how fables deal with the question of genre more generally but also with specific works or authors how they approximate and at the same time distinguish themselves from these influences what the aim of this approximation might be and through which means references to

genres are made the 21 contributions by internationally renowned fable scholars provide for the first time an overview of the interaction of fables and other genres

this work in the field of digital literary stylistics and computational literary studies is concerned with theoretical concerns of literary genre with the design of a corpus of nineteenth century spanish american novels and with its empirical analysis in terms of subgenres of the novel the digital text corpus consists of 256 argentine cuban and mexican novels from the period between 1830 and 1910 it has been created with the goal to analyze thematic subgenres and literary currents that were represented in numerous novels in the nineteenth century by means of computational text categorization methods to categorize the texts statistical classification and a family resemblance analysis relying on network analysis are used with the aim to examine how the subgenres which are understood as communicative conventional phenomena can be captured on the stylistic textual level of the novels that participate in them

autobiography a fully recognised genre within mainstream literature today has evolved massively in the last few decades particularly through colonial and postcolonial texts by using autobiography as a means of expression many postcolonial writers were able to describe their experiences in the face of the denial of personal expression for centuries this book is centred around the recounting and analysis of such a phenomenon literary purists often reject autobiography as a fully fledged literary genre perceiving it rather as a mere life report or a descriptive diary the colonial and postcolonial autobiographical texts analysed in this book refute such perceptions and demonstrate a subtle combination of literary qualities and the recounting of real life experiences this book demonstrates that colonial and postcolonial autobiographical texts have established their literarity the need for postcolonial authors to express themselves through the i and the me as subjects and not as objects is the

essence of this book and confirms that self affirmation through autobiographical writing is indeed an art form

roman letters offers a rich selection of original translations of ancient roman letters spanning from the 1st century bce to the 2nd century ce chronologically arranged and grouped according to author or collection the letters cover various topics and themes selected from a broad range of authors a unique single volume text that makes classical letters accessible and readable to undergraduates and the non specialist reader presents a wide range of authors and material with over 200 selected texts includes selections that illustrate a complete cycle of correspondence as well as letters written by the same author and covering the same topic theme but sent to different recipients letters are arranged chronologically with letters grouped according to author or collection an accompanying website offers additional complementary letters topical index highlights various topics and themes represented by the letters

in writing genres amy j devitt examines genre from rhetorical social linguistic professional and historical perspectives and explores genre s educational uses making this volume the most comprehensive view of genre theory today writing genres does not limit itself to literary genres or to ideas of genres as formal conventions but additionally provides a theoretical definition of genre as rhetorical dynamic and flexible which allows scholars to examine the role of genres in academic professional and social communities writing genres demonstrates how genres function within their communities rhetorically and socially how they develop out of their contexts historically how genres relate to other types of norms and standards in language and how genres nonetheless enable creativity devitt also advocates a critical genre pedagogy based on these ideas and provides a rationale for first year writing classes grounded in teaching antecedent genres
