although readers of detective fiction ordinarily expect to learn the mystery s solution at the end there is another

kind of detective story the history of which encompasses writers as diverse as poe borges robbe grillet auster and stephen king that ends with a question rather than an answer the detective not only fails to solve the crime but also confronts insoluble mysteries of interpretation and identity as the contributors to detecting texts contend such stories belong to a distinct genre the metaphysical detective story in which the detective hero's inability to interpret the mystery inevitably casts doubt on the reader's similar attempt to make sense of the text and the world detecting texts includes an introduction by the editors that defines the metaphysical detective story and traces its history from poe's classic tales to today's postmodernist experiments in addition to the editors contributors include stephen bernstein joel black john t irwin jeffrey t nealon and others

brain health as opposed to mental health is a neglected phenomenon less discovered but now capturing more attention currently the concepts surrounding brain health are vague and no clear definition of this term exists assessing brain health early in life may offer insights into impending disruptions in brain function if deteriorating or poor health of the brain is detected at a young age therapeutic steps can be taken the definition of brain health is the preservation of optimal brain integrity and mental and cognitive function at a given age in the absence of overt brain diseases that affect normal brain function recently cognitive age has been used as a better indicator of brain health called the cognitive clock this book reviews for example fmri eeg and pet scans as well as measuring certain blood and csf biomarker levels a new noninvasive cost effective and easily implemented tool for gauging brain health is introduced this tool can be used in rural communities as well as in low and middle income countries Imic this book focuses on the development of this new tool for brain health measurement as well as its cross validation in diseased and healthy populations

original stories or familiar children's stories that ask learners to investigate a possible scientific explanation for a problem or scenario learners then communicate their findings in an oral written pictorial or technological form back to a lead character from the story extension activities provide an opportunity for learners to compare their answers with what scientists already know about the world and also motivate them to frame new questions

this book explores the changing image of the criminal in america during the 19th century as portrayed in the journalism fiction and memoirs of the period starting from the position that crime inherently a political subject can only be understood in its social context the author reviews newspapers such as the national police gazette 1845 and the world 1897 to show how journalists reported murders and portrayed such criminals as langdon w moore and the assassin guiteau an examination of the antebellum press the detective story the serial thriller and the fiction of edgar allan poe and george lippard indicates how fictional crimes and criminals were portrayed the views of police detectives and offenders are reviewed to determine how they viewed the crimes in which they were involved the commentary on 19th century writings notes a gradual loss of critical perspective on crime after a brief period in the antebellum years the critical period linked crime and politics and drew conclusions from the linkages later as modern society stabilized writings lost a concern about crime's political meanings and consequences the book argues that crime and criminals must not be viewed uncritically as absolute phenomena but rather as dynamic social and political phenomena framed by the values and perspectives of a given society in a given period ncjrs modified
