with this latest installment Nelly Sfeir y de González has completed her trilogy of bibliographies on Gabriel García Márquez born in Colombia in 1927. García Márquez has become one of the most outstanding and influential novelists of the 20th century; he has received numerous awards including the 1982 Nobel Prize for Literature. His work has generated an enormous amount of scholarship and his writings are part of the curricula taught in most American colleges and universities. This third volume presents a comprehensive annotated bibliography of books, articles, and non-print materials by and about García Márquez published between 1992 and 2002. The first part consists of primary sources by García Márquez while the second part brings together entries for secondary sources including reviews.

Drawing on extensive research in the Spanish National Archive, Alejandro Herrero Olaizola examines the role played by the censorship apparatus of Franco's Spain in bringing about the Latin American literary boom of the 1960s and 1970s. He reveals the negotiations and behind-the-scenes maneuvering among those involved in the Spanish publishing industry: converging interests made strange bedfellows of the often left-wing authors and the staid officials appointed to stand guard over Francoist morality and to defend the supposed purity of Castilian Spanish. Between these two uneasily allied groups circulated larger-than-life real-world characters like the Barcelona publisher Carlos Barral and the all-powerful literary agent Carmen Balcells. The author details the fascinating story of how novels by Mario Vargas Llosa, Guillermo Cabrera Infante, Gabriel García Márquez, and Manuel Puig achieved publication in Spain and, in doing so, reached a worldwide market. This colorful account underpins a compelling claim that even the most innovative and aesthetically challenging literature has its roots in the economics of the book trade as well as the institutions of government and the exigencies of everyday politics and ideology.

The dispassionate intellectual examination of the concepts of death and dying contrasts dramatically with the emotive grieving process experienced by those who mourn. Death and dying are binary concepts in human cultures; cultural differences reveal their mutual exclusiveness in philosophical outlook, language, and much more. Other sets of binaries come into play under intellectual consideration and emotive behavior, which further divide and shape perceptions, beliefs, and actions of individuals and groups. The presence or absence of religious beliefs about life and death and disposition of the body and/or soul are prime distinctions. Likewise, the age-old binary of reason vs. faith to many observers. The topic of death and dying in the Hispanic cultural tradition is usually limited to that of Mexico and its transmogrified religious festival day of Día de los Muertos. The studies presented in the ten chapters and editorial introductions to the themes of the book seek to widen this representation and set forth the implications of the binary aspects of death and dying in numerous cultures throughout the so-called Hispanic world, including indigenous and European-derived beliefs and practices in religion.
