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africans in the americas presents a comparative and comprehensive survey of the african diaspora in the western hemisphere from the arrival of the first africans to contemporary times organized chronologically the book begins with a review of the early history of africa and details its relationship with europe continuing with a comparative history of the slave trade throughout the western hemisphere it then explores the progress of the african experience through emancipation specifically in the caribbean brazil latin america and the united states it concludes by analyzing race economics and politics in modern times with its broad view of african american history and its portrayal of the roles of africans and their descendants in the development of both north and south america the book confirms the diaspora as an integral part of world history africans in the americas affirms africa s vital enduring contribution to the americas and to the global community back cover

the rich history of encounters prior to world war i between people from german speaking parts of europe and people of african descent has gone largely unnoticed in the historical literature not least because germany became a nation and engaged in colonization much later than other european nations this volume presents intersections of black and german history over eight centuries while mapping continuities and ruptures in germans perceptions of blacks juxtaposing these intersections demonstrates that negative german perceptions of blackness proceeded from nineteenth century racial theories and that earlier constructions of race were far more differentiated the contributors present a wide range of black german encounters from representations of black saints in religious medieval art to black hessians fighting in the american revolutionary war from cameroonian children being educated in germany to african american

agriculturalists in germany's protectorate togoland each chapter probes individual and collective responses to these intercultural points of contact

the forced migration of africans to the americas through the transatlantic slave trade created primary centres of settlement in the caribbean brazil and the united states the cornerstones of the new world and the black americas however unlike brazil and the us the caribbean did not and still does not have the uniformity of a national framework instead the region presents differing situations and social experiences born of the varying colonial systems from which they were developed using the caribbean experience as the focus christine chivallon examines the transatlantic slave trade and slavery as founding events in the identification of a black diaspora experience the exploration is extended to include the united states to exemplify contrasting situations in slavery based systems and identifies the links between the expressions of culture emanating from the black populations of the new world and the diversity of interpretations of the cultural identities of the black americas divided into three main parts the black diaspora of the americas firstly examines the foundation of the black experiences of the new world by considering the slave trade the second part takes a more theoretical examination of black diaspora using rastafarianism garveyism and pan africanism while referencing the work of a range of thinkers including stuart hall paul gilroy richard price douard glissant melville herskovits and sidney mintz the work is concluded in the third part with the proposition of an a centred community of persons of african descent a culture devoid of centrality the black diaspora of the americas brings together the key arguments about creolisation and the concept of a black diaspora and presents an outstanding contribution to understanding the dynamics of diaspora

providing a history of black people outside africa this book describes the societies from which africans were seized for slavery their long struggle for freedom and their experience today in different countries from britain and america to jamaica haiti and brazil

continuing perspectives on the black diaspora is a response to a 1990 publication that studied the persistence and resilience of black african diasporic populations in the caribbean latin america north america and the united kingdom in that book the authors used the themes of persistence and resilience to interrogate the social processes and the coping repertoire of these diasporic populations this volume investigates the often overlooked african presence in asia researchers sought to determine how many of these diasporic populations have fared in the context of political independence globalization economic marginalization and the presence of ethnic conflict and institutional racism even with positive class formations and declining significance of race in other geographical areas prescriptions for the continued viability of these diasporic populations are provided india and china are undergoing a global renaissance emerging as potentially significant economic political and cultural actors on the world scene meanwhile ancestral africa is still socially politically and economically fragmented thereby causing a new migratory push to north america and europe

this work sets forth the argument that in the age of neoliberal globalization black people around the world are ever so slowly becoming african americanized they are integrated and embourgeoised in the racial class dialectic of black america by the material and ideological influences of the protestant ethic and the spirit of capitalism as promulgated throughout the diaspora by two social class language games of the black american community the black underclass hip hop culture speaking for and representing black youth practical consciousness and black american charismatic liberal conservative bourgeois protestant preachers like td jakes creflo dollar etc speaking for and representing the black bourgeois educated professional and working classes although on the surface the practical consciousness and language of the two social class language games appear to diametrically oppose one another the authors argue given the two groups material wealth within the protestant ethic and the spirit of capitalism of corporate neoliberal america they do not both groups have the same underlying practical consciousness subjects agents of the protestant ethic and the spirit of capitalism the divergences where they exist are due to their interpellation embourgeoisement and differentiation via different ideological apparatuses of the society church and education i e schools for the latter and prisons the streets and athletic and entertainment industries for the former contemporarily in the age of globalization and neoliberalism both groups have become the bearers of ideological and linguistic domination in black neoliberal america and are antagonistically converging the practical consciousness of the

black or african diaspora towards their respective social class language games we are suggesting that the socialization of other black people in the diaspora ought to be examined against and within the dialectical backdrop of this class power dynamic and the cultural and religious heritages of the black american people responsible for this phenomenon or process of convergence we are referring to as the african americanization of the black diaspora

despite the economic utopianism brought on by globalization effective solutions to the persistent plight of urban blacks throughout the african diaspora continue to elude scholars politicians and community leaders charles green brings a decade of research and original fieldwork in africa the caribbean and the united states to investigate the interface of the historic racism faced by these urban communities and contemporary trends of globalization green pays particular attention to the condition of the youth whose aspirations vulnerabilities and insights into their own conditions are central to the future prospects for their communities as a whole considering the impacts of economic restructuring and cultural diffusion alike his analysis asserts the importance of both global ties and local distinctiveness ultimately manufacturing powerlessness aims to encourage the formation of alliances throughout the diaspora so that urban black communities can manufacture a future of empowerment visit the author s web page

this volume draws attention to the plight of urban blacks in the contemporary world and links their situation across five key global regions it argues that while the world s population is predominantly urban persons of african descent are disproportionately urbanized and impoverished and it shows how significant changes in the global arena among them new information technology the increased hegemony of market structures and the resulting socioeconomic instability have altered the material circumstances of these and other poor and working class urban dwellers the book argues further that although the problems triggered by the late twentieth century challenge appear to impact blacks uniformly the societal and cultural specific dimensions of their plight should not be overlooked its findings and implications buttress the need for greater unity among urban blacks in the diaspora as well as offer solutions that are sensitive to their societal and cultural differences

reflecting current debates in the intersecting fields of african american studies and african diaspora these critical essays and case studies explore the articulation between the fluctuating concepts of race and diaspora and the negotiations of identities across differences

june roberts explores the complicated post colonial infrastructure of caribbean society and life as an african american through the work of erna brodber brodber s novels jane and louisa will soon come home myal and louisiana all explore various facets of the caribbean and african american experiences and roberts greatly adds to their value through her commentary and interpretation while she uses erna brodber s books organizing themes as a home base roberts doesn t limit her work to strict criticism and analysis of the novels instead she traces countless issues as varied as the nuances of the caribbean psyche the importance of matriarchs traditional slave dances obeahs santeria and other african based religious expressions as well as politics and history and the perspectives of past and present scholars of the caribbean and african american experience most importantly roberts investigates how the colonial system s exploitation and dehumanization of the black people affected their spirits this text is broad enough to appeal to all enthusiasts of caribbean and african american topics and it can especially benefit academic courses related to these topics
