- 5 Professional Boundaries and Dual Relationships General practitioners must maintain clear professional boundaries with patients avoiding personal or financial relationships that could compromise their professional judgment Ethical implications Dual relationships can create conflicts of interest and potentially harm the patientdoctor relationship*

Clinical Method in Action A Case Example Lets consider a fictional patient Sarah who presents to her GP with persistent fatigue and weight loss Heres how the clinical method would be applied

- 1 History Taking The GP would begin by taking a detailed history asking Sarah about her symptoms medical history family history medications and lifestyle factors This information would be used to identify potential causes of her fatigue and weight loss*
- 2 Physical Examination The GP would conduct a thorough physical examination assessing Sarahs vital signs listening to her heart and lungs and examining her abdomen*
- 3 Investigations Based on the history and examination the GP might order further investigations such as blood tests imaging studies or referral to a specialist to gain further insights into Sarahs condition*
- 4 Diagnosis After analyzing the information gathered the GP would make a diagnosis considering the most likely causes of Sarahs symptoms based on the evidence*
- 5 Management Plan 4 Based on the diagnosis the GP would develop a management plan that might include medication lifestyle modifications further investigations or referral to another healthcare professional*

Conclusion The clinical method is a fundamental framework for general practice ensuring patient centered care and ethical decisionmaking As healthcare evolves GPs continue to adapt the clinical method to incorporate advancements in evidencebased medicine technology and patientcentered care By adhering to ethical principles and embracing innovation general practitioners continue to play a vital role in providing highquality compassionate healthcare to diverse populations
