in a volume that brings together a wide range of disciplines art history sociology architecture cultural anthropology and environmental psychology irene cieraad presents a collection of articles that focuses on the practices and symbolism of domestic space in western society these essays go beyond the discussion of conventional issues such as aesthetics and social standing at home takes an in depth anthropological look at how different cultures use their homes as a visual model of the culture s social structure

this book examines emerging automated technologies and systems and the increasingly prominent roles that each plays in our lives and our imagined futures it asks how technological futures are being constituted and the roles anthropologists can play in their making how anthropologists engage with emerging technologies within their fieldwork contexts in research which seeks to influence future design how to create critical and interventional approaches to technology design and innovation and how a critical anthropology of the way that emerging technologies are experienced in everyday life circumstances offers new insights for future making practices in pursuing these questions this book responds to a call for new anthropologies that respond to the current and emerging technological environments in which we live environments for which thinking critically about the possible plausible and impossible futures are no longer sufficient taking the next step this book asserts that anthropology must now propose alternative ways rooted in ethnography to approach and engage with what is coming and to contest dominant narratives of industry policy and government and to respond to our contemporary context through a public vocal and interventional approach

art observation and an anthropology of illustration examines the role of sketches drawings and other artworks in our understanding of human cultures of the past bringing together art historians and anthropologists it presents a selection of detailed case studies of various bodies of work produced by non western and western artists from different world regions and from different time periods from native north america cameroon and nepal to italy solomon islands and mexico to explore the contemporary relevance and challenges implicit in

artistic renditions of past peoples and places in an age when identities are partially constructed on the basis of existing visual records the book asks important questions about the nature of observation and the inclusion of culturally relevant information in artistic representations how reliable are watercolours paintings or sketches for the understanding of past ways of life how do old images of bygone peoples relate to art historical and anthropological canons how have these images and technologies of representation been used to describe illustrate or explain unknown realities the book is an essential tool for art historians anthropologists and anyone who wants to understand how the observation of different realities has impacted upon the production of art and visual cultures incorporating current methodological and theoretical tools the 10 chapters collected here expand the area of connection between the disciplines of art history and anthropology bringing into sharp focus the multiple intersections of objectivity evidence and artistic licence

in studying material culture anthropologists and archaeologists use meaningful physical objects from a culture to help understand the less tangible aspects of that culture such as societal structure rituals and values what happens when these objects are destroyed by war natural disaster or other historical events through detailed explanations of eleven international case studies the contributions reveal that the absence of objects can be just as telling as their presence while the objects created to memorialize a loss also have important cultural implications covering everything from organ donation to funerary rituals to prisoners of war the archaeology of absence is written at an important intersection of archaeological and anthropological study divided into three sections this volume uses the presence of absence to compare cultural perceptions of material qualities and created memory the mind body connection temporality and death this rich text provides a strong theoretical framework for anthropologists and archaeologists studying material culture
