Concise Encyclopedia Of Pragmatics The Power of Implicature Understanding Whats Not Said Communication is a complex dance often involving more than just the literal meaning of words In the realm of pragmatics we delve into the unspoken exploring how context and shared knowledge influence meaning One crucial concept in this field is implicature the meaning that is implied but not explicitly stated This article unpacks the concept of implicature its types and its role in everyday communication What is Implicature Implicature refers to the extra meaning conveyed by a speaker that goes beyond the literal content of their utterance This meaning is inferred by the listener based on contextual cues shared knowledge and common sense Its essentially the hidden meaning in a conversation Key Features of Implicature Nontruthconditional Implicatures are not part of the literal truth of a statement They can be cancelled or withdrawn without affecting the truth of the statement itself Contextual Implicatures are heavily dependent on the context in which the utterance is made Inferential The listener must infer the implicature based on the speakers utterance and the surrounding context Types of Implicature There are two primary types of implicature 1 Conversational Implicature These arise from the cooperative principle a framework proposed by philosopher Paul Grice It suggests that participants in a conversation generally aim to be truthful informative relevant and clear Types of Conversational Implicatures Generalized Conversational Implicature These are independent of the specific context and arise from the general principles of cooperative communication For example 2 Some of the students passed the exam Implies Not all students passed John went to the store Implies John went to the store to buy something Particularized Conversational Implicature These are specific to a particular context and depend on the shared knowledge between the speaker and listener For example Scenario Sarah is at a party talking to her friend John about a mutual acquaintance Tom Sarah says Tom is a really nice guy Implicature Based on their shared knowledge John might infer that Sarah is implying that Tom is not just nice but also a good person overall possibly contradicting a previous negative opinion John had about Tom 2 Conventional Implicature These arise from the conventional meaning of certain words or expressions They are not dependent on the cooperative principle or specific context Examples of Conventional Implicatures He is a good doctor but This implies that something negative about the doctor follows Youre either with us or against us This implies that there are only two possible positions Factors Influencing Implicature Several factors influence the interpretation of implicature Speakers intention The speakers intention plays a crucial role in determining the intended implicature Contextual knowledge Shared knowledge and understanding between the speaker and listener are essential for interpreting the implicature Social norms Cultural and social norms can influence the interpretation of implicatures For example in some cultures directness is highly valued while in others indirectness is preferred Linguistic features Linguistic features such as intonation stress and word choice can signal specific implicatures Examples of Implicature in Everyday Communication Im going to the movies Implicature The speaker is inviting the listener to come along Its hot in here Implicature The speaker is requesting someone to open a window or turn down the heat Can you pass the salt Implicature The speaker is requesting the salt to be passed Importance of Understanding Implicature 3 Recognizing and understanding implicature is crucial for successful communication It helps us to Decode unspoken meanings We can interpret the
