This ambitious and wide-ranging theory of our contemporary digital condition will be of great interest to students and scholars in media and communications, cultural studies and social political and cultural theory, as well as to a wider readership interested in the ways in which culture and politics are changing today.

Background problem statement: On one hand, a large body of literature in international business and cross-cultural management focuses on differences in national cultures. On the other hand, there is an emerging and quickly growing number of studies devoted to uncover differences in attitudes and consumer habits between generations, notably mentioning terms such as digital natives or Generation Z. Objectives: It has been known that users behave differently in cyberspace than in real world cyberspace. However, creates an arena for a different kind of socialization and for specific patterns in consumer behavior.
