catholic sisters narratives of authority and the native american boarding schools 1847 1918 brings to light a largely unknown of history of the catholic native american boarding schools run by catholic sisters elisabeth c davis examines four schools the first one established by catholic women in the united states in 1847 and the last ending in 1918 using previously unexplored archival material davis examines how catholic sisters established authority over their students and the local indigenous communities in doing so davis sheds new light on the role of women during the eras of american expansion settler imperialism and the boarding school era

the korean peninsula underwent a continuous number of earth shaking events in the twentieth century although it is generally out of the earthquake zone jutting off the extreme northeast edge of the eurasian landmass and with a combined population of nearly seventy million people north and south korea are situated among china japan and russia they are also profoundly influenced by the united states because of the circumstances of the korean war 1950 1953 the issues of war and peace left over from the korean war remain unresolved these two separate states are the residue of the cold war this anomaly still poses ominous prospects for war or peace in asia and american national security interests focusing on the last hundred years of korea s long history and its particular relationship with china one is in a position both to understand and marvel at the events of this century on the korean peninsula at the same time the complexity of the division of the country into north and south korea not just a perennial struggle between good and evil although that is certainly part of the story places the future at risk there was one terrible war that divided the 20th century in half and there are threats of more trouble to come this study of the history of the past century will provide some answers and open the way to informed speculations

almost every educational idea worth a thought has been considered at the university of illinois and anything worth trying has been tested in this history of ideas bill cope and walter feinberg chronicle the intellectual lives of education thinkers at the university while tracking the development of educational ideas and practices in general cope and feinberg draw on conversations narratives and archival

research that reveal how different generations explored their role in defining and carrying out the college's multifaceted mission their account raises critical questions about the character of learning the aims of teaching and the nature of teaching as a profession at the same time the authors address issues that range from the role of schools in fostering individual and collective identity to the introduction of computer mediated and online learning cope and feinberg examine changes in self understanding about fundamental ideas and chart how the college evolved from its original narrow mission of training children's schoolteachers to embracing global perspectives a wide ranging portrait of an institution arguments for learning uses the school of education to tell the stories of thinkers dedicated to the idea that education can change the world for the better

with critical issues like desegregation and funding facing our schools dissatisfaction with public education has reached a new high teachers decry inadequate resources while critics claim educators are more concerned with job security than effective teaching though urban education has reached crisis proportions contending players have difficulty agreeing on a common program of action this book tells why changing urban education confronts the prevailing naivete in school reform by examining the factors that shape reinforce or undermine reform efforts edited by one of the nation's leading urban scholars it examines forces for change and resistance in urban education and proposes that the barrier to reform can only be overcome by understanding how schools fit into the broader political contexts of their cities much of the problem with our schools lies with the reluctance of educators to recognize the profoundly political character of public education the contributors show how urban political contexts vary widely with factors like racial composition the role of the teachers union and relations between cities and surrounding metropolitan areas presenting case studies of original field research in baltimore chicago houston and six other urban areas they consider how resistance to desegregation and the concentration of the poor in central urban areas affect education and they suggest how cities can build support for reform through the involvement of business and other community players by demonstrating the complex interrelationship between urban education and politics this book shows schools to be not just places for educating children but also major employers and large spenders of tax dollars it also introduces the concept of civic capacity the ability of educators and non educators to work together on common goals and suggests that this key issue must be addressed before education can be improved changing urban education makes it clear to educators that the outcome of reform efforts depends heavily on their political context as it reminds political scientists that education is a major part of the urban mix while its prognosis is not entirely optimistic it sets forth important guidelines that cannot be ignored if our schools are to successfully prepare children for the future

the last indian war was fought against native american children in the dormitories and classrooms of government boarding schools only by removing indian children from their homes for extended periods of time policymakers reasoned could white civilization take root while childhood memories of savagism gradually faded to the point of extinction in the words of one official kill the indian and save the man education for extinction offers the first comprehensive account of this dispiriting effort much more than a study of federal indian policy this book vividly details the day to day experiences of indian youth living in a total institution designed to reconstruct them both psychologically and culturally the assault on identity came in many forms the shearing off of braids the assignment of new names uniformed drill routines humiliating punishments relentless attacks on native religious beliefs patriotic indoctrinations suppression of tribal languages victorian gender rituals football contests and industrial training especially poignant is adams s description of the ways in which students resisted or accommodated themselves to forced assimilation many converted to varying degrees but others plotted escapes committed arson and devised ingenious strategies of passive resistance adams also argues that many of those who seemingly cooperated with the system were more than passive players in this drama that the response of accommodation was not synonymous with cultural surrender this is especially apparent in his analysis of students who returned to the reservation he reveals the various ways in which graduates struggled to make sense of their lives and selectively drew upon their school experience in negotiating personal and tribal survival in a world increasingly dominated by white men the discussion comes full circle when adams reviews the government s gradual retreat from the assimilationist vision partly because of persistent student resistance but also partly because of a complex and sometimes contradictory set of progressive humanitarian and racist motivations policymakers did eventually come to view boarding schools less enthusiastically based upon extensive use of government archives indian and teacher autobiographies and school newspapers adams s moving account is essential reading for scholars and general readers alike interested in western history native american studies american race relations education history and multiculturalism

not since the great depression of the 1930s has the united states faced such a prolonged period of high unemployment and underemployment recovery from the great recession that began in 2008 has been slow and is projected to remain sluggish over the next several years while another shock to the global economy could erase the meager gains of the past months economic conditions remain fragile and employment challenges show no sign of letting up with persistently high unemployment and underemployment and growing inequality in wages an increasing number of american families are no longer adequately supported by employment income and basic benefits many older workers have retired before they are ready and many young workers cannot find a foothold in the job

market a silent crisis is underway with huge social and economic costs for the nation working and living in the shadow of economic fragility examines the current state of employment through historical macroeconomic cultural sociological and policy lenses in order to address fundamental questions about the role and value of work in america today the book offers suggestions for how to address the short and long term challenges of rebuilding a society of opportunity with meaningful and sustaining jobs as the foundation of the american middle class

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
