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hope isn t stupid is the first study to interrogate the neglected connections between affect and the
practice of utopia in contemporary american literature although these concepts are rarely
theorized together it is difficult to fully articulate utopia without understanding how affects
circulate within utopian texts moving away from science fiction the genre in which utopian visions
are often located author sean grattan resuscitates the importance of utopianism in recent
american literary history doing so enables him to assert the pivotal role contemporary american
literature has to play in allowing us to envision alternatives to global neoliberal capitalism
novelists william s burroughs dennis cooper john darnielle toni morrison thomas pynchon and
colson whitehead are deeply invested in the creation of utopian possibilities a return to reading
