a trenchant and wide ranging look at this alarming national trend disrupting the school to prison pipeline is unsparing in its account of the problem while pointing in the direction of meaningful and much needed reforms the school to prison pipeline has received much attention in the education world over the past few years a fast growing and disturbing development it describes a range of circumstances whereby children are funneled out of public schools and into the juvenile and criminal justice systems scholars educators parents students and organizers across the country have pointed to this shocking trend insisting that it be identified and understood and that it be addressed as an urgent matter by the larger community this new volume from the harvard educational review features essays from scholars educators students and community activists who are working to disrupt reverse and redirect the pipeline alongside these authors are contributions from the people most affected youth and adults who have been incarcerated or whose lives have been shaped by the school to prison pipeline through stories essays and poems these individuals add to the book s comprehensive portrait of how our education and justice systems function and how they fail to serve the interests of many young people

schools are often the safest most stable and most consistent forces in the lives of many children exerting a positive even miraculous influence they are places where many children are most likely to develop healthy positive relationships with peers and adults however it has become increasingly clear that the opposite also holds true for a number of children including a high proportion of poor children of color some school policies can drive students out before they have obtained the skills and credentials to advance in their lives leading to devastating and permanent consequences particularly on youths without other safety nets or supports to draw on more and more often schools and prisons are being mentioned in the same sentence the language of both institutions becoming interchangeable this issue describes how school policies can have the effect if not the intent of setting youths on the prison track it also identifies programs and policies that can help schools maintain safety and order while simultaneously reaching out to those students most in need of structure education and guidance offering a balanced perspective this issue begins to point the way toward less punitive more effective hopeful directions this is the 99th volume of the quarterly journal new directions for youth development

this workbook is geared towards youth ages 12 19 who read through real life stories and questions contained in the 5 steps workbook together with an adult facilitator the workbook is

designed to open natural restorative conversations around real life experiences which urban youth may encounter the workbook is a story of one family's journey through the 5 steps as they try to avoid the traps which await them in an invisible pipeline the characters are 15 year old jaleesa 16 year old robert their mom latonia and their dad robert sr

this edited volume focuses on the role that school climate and disciplinary practices have on the educational and social experiences of students of color

from education to incarceration dismantling the school to prison pipeline is a ground breaking book that exposes the school system's direct relationship to the juvenile justice system the book reveals various tenets contributing to unnecessary expulsions leaving youth vulnerable to the streets and ultimately behind bars

this important volume examines how and why increasing numbers of students disproportionately youth of color are being taken from our schools and put into our prisons williamson and appleman along with a collection of scholars teacher educators k 12 teachers administrators and incarcerated students offer their perspectives on how schooling can be restructured to disrupt this flow and dismantle the school to prison pipeline they present clearly articulated strategies on curriculum pedagogy and disciplinary practices that can help redirect our collective efforts away from carceral practices by considering chapters from prison educators and currently incarcerated students the end of the pipeline readers will plainly see the disciplinary and curricular issues that need to be addressed in our schools the text includes examples of meaningful ways to engage students that could be incorporated into a variety of classrooms from social studies to science to english language arts book features instructive cautionary tales with specific pedagogical and policy suggestions alternatives to discipline in schools such as restorative justice and positive behavioral support insights to help educators consider the trajectory of their students as well as suggestions for making the curriculum both relevant and sustaining directly addresses the ways in which an understanding of the mechanisms of the school to prison pipeline can be woven into teacher preparation

preventing the school to prison pipeline is the first book written to provide school psychologists and other k 12 mental health professionals with knowledge and strategies intended to help them disrupt the criminalization of historically oppressed learners in today's classrooms a phenomenon of the united states intersecting education and criminal justice systems the school to prison pipeline is the process by which school staff punish already marginalized or at risk students primarily black youth in ways that enable a lifetime of targeting by police court and carceral operations exploring the unmet needs of students with mental emotional and behavioral health disorders the effects of implicit and explicit bias adverse school and court policies and other biopsychosocial factors this powerful book offers a preventative public health approach to providing clinical care to vulnerable students without compromising school safety school psychologists counselors and social workers will come away with urgent and actionable insights into advocacy collaboration preventive interventions alternative discipline measures in schools and more

examines the relationship between the law and the school to prison pipeline argues that law can be an effective weapon in the struggle to reduce the number of children caught and discusses the consequences on families and communities

a bold manifesto arguing that there is a clear precedent for paying reparations to atone for america's original sin of slavery offering a compelling legal strategy to achieve this goal from the acclaimed author of the whiteness of wealth the idea of reparations is not a new or original one it is one that is baked into american history when the district of columbia emancipation act of 1862 went into effect wealthy slaveowners like margaret barber were compensated for the loss of their enslaved workers barber received 9 000 an equivalent to 250 000 today when a group of italian immigrants were lynched in 1892 president harrison compensated italy a total of 25 000 for their deaths an equivalent to almost 766 000 today the indian claims commission an arm of the federal government paid indigenous americans 818 million for underhandedly stealing their land in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries an equivalent to almost 350 billion today dorothy a brown addresses the glaring question if reparations can be achieved for others why not for black americans if lynching can be remedied for italian immigrants and slaveholders compensated for losses associated with abolition and emancipation then the government's failure to provide such remedies to black communities harmed by similar violence loss and

destruction is long overdue the fight for reparations is truly a fight for the soul of america to produce the country our founding fathers idealized but never achieved getting to reparations makes a logical and necessary case for reparations for black americans it lays out a path as to how we might achieve this built on the frameworks used throughout u s history by the government to pay restitution it is now time to do the same for america s black population

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hip hop and dismantling the school to prison pipeline was created for k 12 students in hopes that they find tangible strategies for creating affirming communities where students parents advocates and community members collaborate to compose liberating and just frameworks that effectively define the school to prison pipeline and identify the nefarious ways it adversely affects their lives this book is for educators activists community organizers teachers scholars politicians and administrators who we hope will join us in challenging the predominant preconceived notion held by many educators that hip hop has no redeemable value lastly the authors editors argue against the understanding of hip hop studies as primarily an academic endeavor situated solely in the academy they understand the fact that people on streets blocks avenues have been living and theorizing about hip hop since its inception this important critical book is an honest thorough powerful and robust examination of the ingenious and inventive ways people who have an allegiance to hip hop work tirelessly in various capacities to dismantle the school to prison pipeline

the school to prison pipeline is an ongoing challenge and trend in the public school system in america due to inequity in the educational system discriminatory policies towards students and families of color and a lack of resources aimed at supporting at risk youth and the economically disadvantaged within the community public schools have made continued progress in shifting their disciplinary policies away from punitive zero tolerance models and towards positive behavioral interventions but there continues to be a disproportionate number of students ending up in the school to prison pipeline from economically disadvantaged communities and homes lawmakers continue to create policies in an effort to make schools safer and more efficient but do not consider the detriment and alienation this impact has on the students or families within the community and potential harmful affects these policies could have on children s futures a qualitative survey was conducted at a public continuation high school in the san francisco unified school district with staff members over the age of 18 to determine whether or not the school to prison pipeline is still a challenge our educational system is facing and whether or not there are adequate supports or measures in place to support students and keep them in school results from this survey suggest that there continues to be an increasing number of students pushed into the school to prison pipeline and a system that is unable to support students in the comprehensive high school setting which leaves them with limited skill sets and restricted options when it comes to their futures based on the findings the recommendation is that districts incorporate work experience programs to incentivize students to stay in school while also helping to support their socioeconomic need to help support their families in a meaningful and productive way in addition districts should explore community based programs to help support and educate families in addressing concerns such as trauma community violence and unstable home environments that continue to prove a detriment to student s ability to perform in school and consequentially plague students overall well being

according to the 2007 national urban league equality index although many black men are doing well glaring economic and other gaps continue to exist between them and their white counterparts because of its devastating and far reaching ramifications the status of the black male is the most serious economic and civil rights challenge we face today the 2007 state of black america report takes up this challenge with a fresh and in depth look at the current conditions facing the black male based on this research and analysis by some of america s best minds the national urban league presents several targeted and comprehensive recommendations designed to eliminate the equality gaps and empower all black americans male and female

this book offers a research and comparison driven look at the school to prison pipeline its racial dynamics the connections to mass incarceration and our flawed educational climate and suggests practical remedies for change how is racism perpetuated by the education system particularly via the school to prison pipeline how is the school to prison pipeline intrinsically connected to the larger context of the prison industrial complex as well as the extensive and ongoing criminalization of youth of color this book uniquely describes the system of policies and practices

that racialize criminalization by routing youth of color out of school and towards prison via the school to prison pipeline while simultaneously medicalizing white youth for comparable behaviors this work is the first to consider and link all of the research and data from a sociological perspective using this information to locate racism in our educational systems describe the rise of the so called prison industrial complex spotlight the concomitant expansion of the medical industrial complex as an alternative for controlling the white and well off both adult and juveniles and explore the significance of media in furthering the white racial frame that typically views people of color as criminals as an automatic response the author also examines the racial dynamics of the school to prison pipeline as documented by rates of suspension expulsion and referrals to legal systems and sheds light on the comparative dynamics of the related educational social control of white and middle class youth in the larger context of society as a whole

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
