artists critics curators and scholars develop theories of craft in relation to art chronicle how fine art institutions understand and exhibit craft media and offer accounts of activist crafting

diva visual history about how feminist artists have appropriated and incorporated the signification of the pin up genre within their own work div

this pioneering book explores the notion of radical decadence as concept aesthetic and lived experience and as an analytical

framework for the study of contemporary feminist textile art gendered discourses of decadence that perpetuate anxieties about women's power consumption and pleasure are deconstructed through images of drug use female sexuality and excessive living in artworks by several contemporary textile artists including Orly Cogan Tracey Emin Allyson Mitchell and Rozanne Hawksley perceptions of decadence are invariably bound to the negative connotations of decay and degradation particularly with regard to the transgression of social norms related to femininity and the female body excessive consumption by women has historically been represented as grotesque and until now women's pleasure in relation to drug and alcohol use has largely gone unexamined in feminist art history and craft studies here representations of female consumption from cupcakes to alcohol and cocaine are opened up for critical discussion drawing on feminist and queer theories Julia Skelly considers portrayals of bad girls in artworks that explore female sexuality performative pieces designed to subvert and exceed feminine roles in this provocative book decadence is understood not as a destructive force but as a liberating aesthetic

this book examines contemporary feminist visual activism's through the lens of embodiment's the contributors explore how the arts articulate and engage with the current sense of crisis and political concerns e.g. equality decolonisation social justice democracy precarity vulnerability negotiated with and through the body drawing upon the legacy of feminist art historical critique the book scrutinises activist strategies practices and resilience techniques in intersectional and transnational frameworks it interrogates how the arts enable the creation of civil and political resilience become engaged with politics as a response to disaster capitalism and attempt to reform and improve society the book will be of interest to scholars working in art history visual culture fine arts women's studies gender studies feminism and cultural studies

crafting feminism develops a dynamic study of craft and art making in modern and contemporary feminist writing in evocative readings of literary works from Virginia Woolf to Zadie Smith this book expands our sense of transartistic modernist scholarship to encompass process oriented and medium specific analyses of textile arts digital design collage photography painting and sculpture in literary culture by integrating these craft practices into the book's enlightening archive Elkins's theoretical argument extends a reading of craft metaphors into the material present crafting feminism demonstrates how writers have engaged with handiwork across generations and have undertaken the crafting of a new modernity one that is queer and feminist threaded messy shattered cut up pasted together preserved repaired reflected and spun out an avant garde work of scholarship this book

interweaves queer research methods and interdisciplinary rigor with a series of surprising archival discoveries making visible the collaborative creative features of craft elkins captivates readers with generous illustrations and a series of techne interchapters interludes between longer chapters which powerfully convey the symbiosis between feminist theory and method and detail the network of archival influences that underpin this volume s hybrid approach foregrounding the work of decentering patriarchal and eurocentric legacies of artistic authority elkins champions the diverse intergenerational history of craft as a way to reposition intersectional makers at the heart of literary culture an original and compelling study crafting feminism breaks new ground in modernist and visual studies digital humanities and feminist queer and critical race theory

in a time of one s own catherine grant examines how contemporary feminist artists are turning to broad histories of feminism ranging from political organizing and artworks from the 1970s to queer art and activism in the 1990s exploring artworks from 2002 to 2017 by artists including sharon hayes mary kelly allyson mitchell deirdre logue lubaina himid pauline boudry and rene lorenz grant maps a revival of feminism that takes up the creative and political implications of forging feminist communities across time and space grant characterizes these artists engagement with feminism as a fannish autodidactic and collective form of learning from history this fandom of feminism allows artists to build relationships with previous feminist ideas artworks and communities that reject a generational model and embrace aspects of feminism that might be seen as embarrassing queer or anachronistic accounting for the growing interest in feminist art politics and ideas across generations grant demonstrates that for many contemporary feminist artists the present moment can only be understood through an embodied engagement with history in which feminist pasts are reinhabited and reimagined

in making things and drawing boundaries critical theory and cultural practice meet creativity collaboration and experimentation with physical materials as never before foregrounding the interdisciplinary character of experimental methods and hands on research this collection asks what it means to make things in the humanities how is humanities research manifested in hand and on screen alongside the essay and monograph and importantly how does experimentation with physical materials correspond with social justice and responsibility comprising almost forty chapters from ninety practitioners across twenty disciplines making things and drawing boundaries speaks directly and extensively to how humanities research engages a growing interest in maker culture however making may be defined contributors erin r anderson joanne bernardi yana boeva jeremy boggs duncan a buell amy burek trisha n campbell debbie chachra beth compton heidi rae cooley nora dimmock devon elliott bill endres katherine faull alexander

explores the ambiguities and contradictions that disrupt the assumed boundaries of battle zones against the fabric of suffering that unfolds around more spectacular injuries and deaths the war in between studies visual depictions of banal routine or inscrutable aspects of militarized violence spaces of the in between are both broader and much less visible than battlefields even though struggles for survival arise out of the same conditions of structural violence visual artifacts including photographs video data visualizations fabric art and craft projects provide different vantage points on the quotidian impacts of militarism whether it is the banality of everyday violence for non combatants or the daily struggles of soldiers living with physical and emotional trauma three interrelated concepts frame the book s attempt to stay in the moment of looking at visual cultures of survival first the concept of the war in between captures those interstitial spaces of war where violence and survival persist side by side second this book expands the concept of indexicality to consider how images of the in between rely on a range of indexical traces to produce alternative visualities about survival and endurance third the book introduces an asymptotic analysis to explore the value in getting close to the diverse experiences that comprise the war in between even if the horizon line of experience is always just out of reach exploring the capaciousness of survival reveals that there is more to feel and engage in war images than just mangled bodies collapsing buildings and industrialized death the war in between kozol argues offers not a better truth about war but an accounting of visualities that arise at the otherwise unthinkable junction of conflict and survival

this edited collection gathers together leading voices in theatre and performance studies to debate the politics of participation and find points of connection across a range of performative forms including community theatre live art applied theatre one to one performance and marathon running arranged in three sections recognising participation labours of participation and authoring participation the book raises productive questions about how and why audiences are encouraged to participate in creating the artistic work this intersection the authors suggest blurs the boundaries between producer and consumer promising modes of engagement that are at once political social and aesthetic applying theoretical ideas to concrete discussions of practice this is an

ideal resource for undergraduate and postgraduate students of applied theatre political and socially engaged theatre participatory theatre making and performance studies

original essays offering fresh ideas and global perspectives on contemporary feminist art the term feminist art is often misused when viewed as a codification within the discipline of art history a codification that includes restrictive definitions of geography chronology style materials influence and other definitions inherent to art historical and museological classifications employing a different approach a companion to feminist art defines art as a dynamic set of material and theoretical practices in the realm of culture and feminism as an equally dynamic set of activist and theoretical practices in the realm of politics feminist art therefore is not a simple classification of a type of art but rather the space where feminist politics and the domain of art making intersect the companion provides readers with an overview of the developments concepts trends influences and activities within the space of contemporary feminist art in different locations ways of making and ways of thinking newly commissioned essays focus on the recent history of and current discussions within feminist art diverse in scope and style these contributions range from essays on the questions and challenges of large sectors of artists such as configurations of feminism and gender in post cold war europe to more focused conversations with women artists on afropean decoloniality ranging from discussions of essentialism and feminist aesthetics to examinations of political activism and curatorial practice the companion informs and questions readers introduces new concepts and fresh perspectives and illustrates just how much more there is to discover within the realm of feminist art addresses the intersection between feminist thinking and major theories that have influenced art theory incorporates diverse voices from around the world to offer viewpoints on global feminisms from scholars who live and work in the regions about which they write examines how feminist art intersects with considerations of collectivity war maternal relationships desire men and relational aesthetics explores the myriad ways in which the experience of inhabiting and perceiving aged raced and gendered bodies relates to feminist politics in the art world discusses a range practices in feminism such as activism language education and different ways of making art the intersection of feminist art making and feminist politics are not merely components of a unified whole they sometimes diverge and divide a companion to feminist art is an indispensable resource for artists critics scholars curators and anyone seeking greater strength on the subject through informed critique and debate
