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arabic rhetoric explores the history disciplines order and pragmatic functions of arabic speech acts it offers a new understanding of arabic rhetoric and employs examples from modern standard arabic as well as providing a glossary of over 448 rhetorical expressions listed in english with their translations which make the book more accessible to the modern day reader hussein s study of arabic rhetoric bridges the gap between learning and research whilst also meeting the academic needs of our present time this up to date text provides a valuable source

for undergraduate students learning arabic as a foreign language and is also an essential text for researchers in arabic islamic studies and students of linguistics and academics

for over thirty years steven mailloux has championed and advanced the field of rhetorical hermeneutics a historically and theoretically informed approach to textual interpretation this volume collects fourteen of his most recent influential essays on the methodology plus an interview following from the proposition that rhetorical hermeneutics uses rhetoric to practice theory by doing history this book examines a diverse range of texts from literature history law religion and cultural studies through four sections mailloux explores the theoretical writings of heidegger burke and rorty among others jesuit educational treatises and products of popular culture such as azar nafisi s reading lolita in tehran and star trek the next generation in doing so he shows how rhetorical perspectives and pragmatist traditions work together as two mutually supportive modes of understanding and he demonstrates how the combination of rhetoric and interpretation works both in theory and in practice theoretically rhetorical hermeneutics can be understood as a form of neopragmatism practically it focuses on the production circulation and reception of written and performed communication a thought provoking collection from a preeminent literary critic and rhetorician rhetoric s pragmatism assesses the practice and value of rhetorical hermeneutics today and the directions in which it might head scholars and students of rhetoric and communication studies critical theory literature law religion and american studies will find mailloux s arguments enlightening and essential

eighteen essays by leading scholars in english speech communication education and philosophy explore the vitality of the classical rhetorical tradition and its influence on both contemporary discourse studies and the teaching of writing some of the essays investigate the theoretical and historical issues others show the bearing of classical rhetoric on contemporary problems in composition thus blending theory and practice common to the varied approaches and viewpoints expressed in this volume is one central theme the 20th century revival of rhetoric entails a recovery of the classical tradition with its marriage of a rich and fully articulated theory with an equally efficacious practice a preface demonstrates the contribution of edward p j corbett to the 20th century revival and a last chapter includes a bibliography of his works

a work which addresses the question what constructive role can pragmatism play either in structuring public debate or in dealing with life the contributors examine what pragmatism can offer in the way of a positive social programme in the field of law and political science

over the years pragmatics the study of the use and meaning of utterances to their situations has become a more and more important branch of linguistics as the inadequacies of a purely formalist abstract approach to the study of language have become more evident this book presents a rhetorical model of pragmatics that is a model which studies linguistic communication in terms of communicative goals and principles of good communicative behaviour in this respect geoffrey leech argues for a rapprochement between linguistics and the traditional discipline of

rhetoric he does not reject the chomskyan revolution of linguistics but rather maintains that the language system in the abstract i e the grammar broadly in chomsky s sense must be studied in relation to a fully developed theory of language use there is therefore a division of labour between grammar and rhetoric or in the study of meaning between semantics and pragmatics the book s main focus is thus on the development of a model of pragmatics within an overall functional model of language in this it builds on the speech act theory of austin and searle and the theory of conversational implicature of grice but at the same time enlarges pragmatics to include politeness irony phatic communion and other social principles of linguistic behaviour

this volume presents recent and unpublished research by chinese scholars from china and the us on ways in which chinese culture influences and intersects with communication theory and practice in china it focuses on communication and cultural concepts as they function in chinese society in the media in the workplace and in the way people think it includes historical analyses of mao s political rhetoric before and during the cultural revolution as well as political rhetoric by deng xiaoping all with a cultural emphasis

this cutting edge work assembles the most current and authoritative new perspectives on the scholarship of advertising rhetoric under the editorial direction of two respected figures in the field

this study explores evolving ideas of musical form from a historical perspective and sheds light on current conceptualizations of music the author examines the image dominant among 18th century composers and analysts of music as a language a kind of wordless discourse which could move audiences in his account of these changing perspectives the author draws on the writings of a broad range of 18th and 19th century theorists his analyses focus on specific sonata form movements by haydn mozart and beethoven and are informed by the theoretical premises that characterize the composers own times in a final synthesis the 18th century rhetorical model with its focus on the structural function of musical ideas and the role of the listener emerges as a forerunner of today s listener orientated and plot theories about musical form the author makes use of literary theory to develop his innovative evaluation of musical form in addition to the text there are several musical examples included

the essays in this volume presented in honour of john o ward explore the role of rhetoric in promoting reform and renewal in the latin west from peter abelard 1079 1142 to juan luis vives 1492 1540 ward who has taught for many years at the university of sydney has been an influential and creative force in medieval and renaissance studies both in australia and internationally this volume opens with a personal memoir and bibliography of ward s publications as well as an overview of the study of medieval rhetoric the first of the three sections abelard and rhetoric relates abelard s rhetoric to his logic his theology and his relationship to heloise a second section voices of reform considers various writers william of malmesbury john of salisbury richard fitznerig and william of ockham who bring rhetorical techniques to bear upon

analysis of social conditions a third section rhetoric in transition deals with the evolution of rhetorical theory between the late fourteenth and early sixteenth centuries the volume will be of interest not just to specialists in rhetoric but to all concerned with issues of reform and renewal in european culture during the period 1100 1540

part of a series in studies in rhetoric and communication this book casts a fresh light on the process by which scientific claims are validated if scientists cannot justify their claims in positivistic terms how can a scientific claim be legitimatized

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
