the unique contribution of this book is to bring together critical race theory and narrative inquiry and apply them specifically to a largely overlooked area of experience within the field of tesol what does it mean to be a tesol professional of color to address this question tesol professionals of color from all over the world representing a wide range of racial ethnic and cultural backgrounds offer accounts of their own experiences responding to two related questions can you identify critical events or conditions in your personal or professional life that are the result of you being a person of color that affect who you are now and what you do as a tesol professional of color what have you learned from these events or conditions that have had a bearing on your life as a tesol professional of color color race and english language teaching shades of meaning is intended for researchers professionals and students in the field of english language teaching the book is designed as a text for matesol programs and courses that deal with issues of language culture and teaching the introduction presents a brief overview of relevant aspects of critical race theory narrative inquiry and educational research focus questions for each chapter are included to help readers apply aspects of the narratives to their own experience

as a study of color in the victorian novel this volume notices and analyzes a peculiar literary phenomenon in which victorian authors who were also trained as artists dream up fantastically colored characters for their fiction these strange and eccentric characters include the purple madwoman bertha mason in charlotte brontë s jane eyre 1847 the blue gentleman oscar dubourg from wilkie collins s poor miss finch 1872 the red peddler diggory venn in thomas

hardy s the return of the native 1878 and the little yellow girls of arthur conan doyle s the yellow face 1893 and frances hodgson burnett s the secret garden 1911 while color has been historically viewed as suspicious and seductive in western culture the victorian period constitutes a significant moment in the history of color the rapid development of new color technologies and the upheavals of the first avant garde art movements result in an increase in coloring s prestige in the art academies at the same time race science appropriates color using it as a criterion for classification in the establishment of global racial hierarchies these artist authors draw on color s traditional association with constructions of otherness to consider questions of identity and difference through the imaginative possibilities of color

by recasting instances of german cultural production around the turns of centuries 1800 1900 2000 the essays in this volume examine the role that color has played in perceiving and representing ethnic difference in innovative essays literary scholars historians anthropologists and art historians support an overarching thesis that the origins of a modern ethnic imagination inscribe patterns of seeing whereas more recent developments involve processes of de colorization and metaphorization

course of these essays readers will learn how americans in different periods and circumstances have grappled with the changing issues of defining race and of defining american as a race as a nationality or as both

emotion and ethics this book illuminates how colors impact our worldviews urging readers to consider the subtle yet significant ways that color influences our understanding of ourselves and the world around us

this book offers a historical and comparative overview of the evolution of racial classifications in the united states latin america and the caribbean the hispanicization of america is precipitating a paradigm shift in racial thinking in which race is no longer defined by distinct characteristics but rather is becoming synonymous with ethnic cultural identity traditionally assimilation has been conceived of as a unidirectional and racialized phenomenon newly arrived immigrant groups or longstanding minority indigenous populations were americanized in confining their racial and ethnic natures to the private sphere and adopting in the public sphere the cultural mores norms and values of the dominant cultural racial group in contrast the hispanicization of america entails the horizontal assimilation of various groups from spanish speaking countries throughout the western hemisphere and caribbean into a pan ethnic hispanic latino identity that also challenges the privileged position of whiteness as the primary and exclusive referent for american identity instead of focusing on one hispanic group ethnic identity or region this book chronicles the development of racial identity across the largest hispanic groups throughout the united states

the history of civil rights in the united states is usually analyzed and interpreted through the lenses of modern conservatism and progressive liberalism in race and liberty in america the essential reader author jonathan bean argues that the historical record does not conveniently fit into either of these categories and that knowledge of the american classical liberal tradition is required to gain a more accurate understanding of the past present and future of civil liberties in the nation by assembling and contextualizing classic documents from the declaration of independence to the civil rights act of 1964 to the 2007 u s supreme court decision banning school assignment by race bean demonstrates that classical liberalism differs from progressive liberalism in emphasizing individual freedom christianity the racial neutrality of the constitution complete color blindness and free market capitalism a

comprehensive and vital resource for scholars and students of civil liberties race and liberty in america presents a wealth of primary sources that trace the evolution of civil rights throughout u s history

what do we mean in the u s today when we use the terms race and ethnicity what do we mean and what do we understand when we use the five standard race ethnic categories white black asian native american and hispanic most federal and state data collection agencies use these terms without explicit attention and thereby create categories of american ethnicity for political purposes davora yanow argues that race and ethnicity are socially constructed concepts not objective scientifically grounded variables and do not accurately represent the real world she joins the growing critique of the unreflective use of race and ethnicity in american policymaking through an exploration of how these terms are used in everyday practices her book is filled with current examples and analyses from a wealth of social institutions health care education criminal justice and government at all levels the questions she raises for society and public policy are endless yanow maintains that these issues must be addressed explicitly publicly and nationally if we are to make our policy and administrative institutions operate more effectively

colour permeates contemporary visual and material culture and affects our senses beyond the superficial encounter by infiltrating our perceptions and memories and becoming deeply rooted in thought processes that categorise and divide along culturally constructed lines colour exists as a cultural as well as psycho physical phenomenon and acquires a multitude of meanings within differing historical and cultural contexts the contributors examine how colour becomes imbued with specific symbolic and material meanings that tint our constructions of race gender ideal bodies the relationship of the self to others and of the self to technology and the built environment by highlighting the relationship of colour across media and material culture this volume reveals the complex interplay of cultural connotations discursive practices and socio psychological dynamics of colour in an international context

although both brazil and the united states inherited european norms that accorded whites privileged status relative to all other racial groups the development of their societies followed different trajectories in defining white black relations in brazil pervasive miscegenation and the lack of formal legal barriers to racial equality gave the appearance of its being a racial democracy with a ternary system of classifying people into whites brancos multiracial individuals pardos and blacks pretos supporting the idea that social inequality was primarily associated with differences in class and culture rather than race in the united states by contrast a binary system distinguishing blacks from whites by reference to the one drop rule of african descent produced a more rigid racial hierarchy in which both legal and informal barriers operated to create socioeconomic disadvantages for blacks but in recent decades reginald daniel argues in this comparative study changes have taken place in both countries that have put them on converging paths brazil s black consciousness movement stresses the binary division between brancos and negros to heighten awareness of and mobilize opposition to the real racial discrimination that exists in brazil while the

multiracial identity movement in the u s works to help develop a more fluid sense of racial dynamics that was long felt to be the achievement of brazil s ternary system against the historical background of race relations in brazil and the u s that he traces in part i of the book including a review of earlier challenges to their respective racial orders daniel focuses in part ii on analyzing the new racial project on which each country has embarked with attention to all the political possibilities and dangers they involve
