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the scene is a madhouse and the focus is on three inmates who are nuclear physicists one thinks he is newton and another
einstein the third has visitations from solomon they appear to be nice likeable lunatics but nothing is as simple as it seems are
they really mad or are they playing some murderous game with the world as the stake who is earnest and who is the spy
gradually we learn that each has been led down the path to moral destruction past the signposts of truth the purity of science
and personal responsibility the asylum to which their paths have led them seems much saner than the mad world they ve left
behind 4 women 16 men

this introductory volume explores the playwright s chaotic universe where god has retreated beyond the stars and where blind
chance is the real prime mover justice is corruptible ideologies useless and tragedy no longer possible yet despite the overriding
pessimism of durrenmatt s weltanschauung the author argues that the playwright remains a genial master of comedy through
the laughter he allows his readers to see that all is not lost that there are virtues worth fighting for and that there are still
courageous don quixotes worthy of the title hero crockett contends that as a theorist of the modern german stage durrenmatt
challenges bertolt brecht and offers alternatives as a craftsman of prose fiction he fashions the stout thread with which the

readers enter his labyrinths and eventually find their way back out while his literary theses cling to gossamer strands sometimes fall prey to the monster in the maze

dürrenmatt's apparently conflicting statements about his central concerns have baffled scholars attempting to interpret his works in his critical approach to dürrenmatt timo tiusanen emphasizes the author's relation to the theater and analyzes the thirteen original stage plays eight radio plays and five adaptations using the special concept of scenic image developed in an earlier study of o'Neill four books by dürrenmatt on the theater and politics are related to the dramatist's creative practice and his six books of prose are also carefully considered exploring the writer's career to reconcile conflicting attitudes that have been taken toward his work timo tiusanen sees dürrenmatt's writings as representing a persistent effort to express artistically a paradoxical view of the world originally published in 1978 the princeton legacy library uses the latest print on demand technology to again make available previously out of print books from the distinguished backlist of princeton university press these editions preserve the original texts of these important books while presenting them in durable paperback and hardcover editions the goal of the princeton legacy library is to vastly increase access to the rich scholarly heritage found in the thousands of books published by princeton university press since its founding in 1905

this book treats arts as part of science from the unified perspective of science matters it contains 17 chapters with 18 contributors who are prominent humanists professional artists or scientists it consists of three parts part i philosophy and history of arts part ii arts in action part iii understanding arts the book is aimed at both research scholars and lay people and is unique in two important aspects it is probably the first and only book that academic professionals and practicing artists contribute to the same book as equals on the common theme of creating and understanding arts artists here include cristina leiria whose huge kun iam goddess of mercy sculpture is an important landmark in macau and the famous movie director hark tsui who is publishing his first ever article on movie making perhaps more importantly a new understanding of the origin and nature of art is offered for the first time which is more convincing than all the other hypotheses put forth in the last two thousand years

traditional studies of theater have long neglected an overall study of female roles as written by male playwrights are the roles blatantly sexist or do they adhere to the cultural norms that even progressive male playwrights cannot ignore from Georg Büchner's *Woyzeck* to David Hare's *Plenty* the ten plays studied here have traditionally been seen as extraordinarily innovative and progressive despite their seeming openness each of the plays is affected by the playwright's sexual politics laid out is a framework for studying the plays in a feminist context that permits a new reading of the female roles while still allowing the critic enjoyment of the performance as a whole

this study focuses on shorter prose texts in post war Germany especially works by Durrenmatt Hochhuth and Walser bringing to bear different but complementary approaches Dr Plouffe considers the novelle and its Anglo Saxon counterparts the short story and novella in their shared themes of uncertain existence and ambiguity of language motifs deriving largely from Freud and Lacan

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
