later she was taking six different drugs including lithium a tranquilliser an antipsychotic and antidepressants she had been diagnosed with bipolar disorder given electric shock therapy made numerous attempts on her life and was alternately manic and consumed by crippling despair during which she could barely move she had a two year old daughter she hardly knew and a mother and partner who were at their wits end unable to recognise the formerly ambitious vibrant and highly successful woman they loved australians have embraced antidepressants twelve million prescriptions are written annually mostly by gps but what do we really know of the pills effects the idea that they correct a chemical imbalance in our brain is by no means proven there is much evidence that contradicts this view it is commonly thought such drugs are not addictive in fact as rebekah found to her great distress they are hard to come off and those who do may suffer debilitating side effects this is a powerful memoir of the nightmarish three years rebekah endured as she was repeatedly misdiagnosed only to realise that her medication was the cause of her mental deterioration rebekah calls for better information from the pharmaceutical companies about the risks associated with antidepressants and similar classes of drugs facts rather than marketing dressed up as medical science and for a re examination of the ways some psychiatrists treat their patients

depression and dysphoria in the fiction of david foster wallace is the first full length study of this critically overlooked theme addressing a major gap in wallace studies wallace has long been recognised as a depression laureate inheriting a mantle previously held by sylvia plath due to the frequent and remarkable depictions of depressed characters in his fiction however this book resists taking wallace s fiction at face value and instead situates close reading of his complex fictions in theoretical dialogue both with philosophical and theoretical texts and with contemporary authors and influences this book explores wallace s complex engagement with philosophical and medical ideas of emotional suffering and demonstrates how this evolves over his career the shifts in wallace s thematic focus on various forms of dysphoria including heartache loneliness boredom and anxiety as well as depression correspond to an increasingly pessimistic philosophy underlying his fiction

ann cvetkovich combines memoir and cultural critique in search of ways of writing about depression as a public cultural and political phenomenon rather than as a personal medical pathology

depression has colonized the world today more than 300 million of us have been diagnosed as depressed but 150 years ago depression referred to a mood not a sickness does that mean people weren't sick before only sad of course not mental illness is a complex thing part biological part social its definition dependent on time and place but in the mid twentieth century even as european empires were crumbling new western clinical models and treatments for mental health spread across the world in so doing depression began to displace older ideas like melancholia the japanese utsushi or the punjabi sinking heart syndrome award winning historian jonathan sadowsky tells this global story chronicling the path breaking work of psychiatrists and pharmacists and the intimate sufferings of patients revealing the continuity of human distress across time and place he shows us how different cultures have experienced intense mental anguish and how they have tried to alleviate it he reaches an unflinching conclusion the devastating effects of depression are real a number of treatments do reduce suffering but a permanent cure remains elusive throughout the history of depression there have been overzealous promoters of particular approaches but history shows us that there is no single way to get better that works for everyone like successful psychotherapy history can liberate us from the negative patterns of the past
