this report identifies potential initiatives for improving army doctrine and capabilities for counterinsurgency and insurgency warfare these include recommendations that the army 1 build and maintain small cadre of counterinsurgency and insurgency experts 2 create along with the other services a counterinsurgency institute to train us and foreign nationals and 3 ensure more appropriate and effective us arms and equipment transfers to countries facing insurgent threats the author also examines the reasons insurgency is likely to continue to be a frequent form of conflict describes the threat of insurgency to important us interests in the third world explores the potential for us army noncombat support to third world countries fighting insurgency describes the impediments to us influence and assistance outlines the potential situations that might lead to us involvement in counterinsurgency combat and discusses the army s role in support of friendly insurgency

foreword this manual takes a general approach to coin the army recognizes that every insurgency is contextual and presents its own set of challenges you cannot fight the taliban the way you would fight the former soviet union the application of principles and fundamentals to deal with each vary considerably nonetheless all insurgencies even today s highly adaptable strains remain wars amongst the people employ variations of standard themes and adhere to elements of a recognizable revolutionary campaign plan this manual therefore addresses the common characteristics of insurgencies it strives to provide those carrying out a counterinsurgency campaign a solid foundation on which to build in seeking to understand and address specific insurgencies a counterinsurgency campaign is as described in this manual a mix of offensive defensive and stability operations conducted along multiple lines of operation it requires soldiers to employ a mix of both familiar combat tasks and skills more often associated with nonmilitary agencies with the balance between them

varying depending on the local situation this is not easy leaders at all levels must adjust their approach constantly ensuring that their elements are ready each day to be greeted with a handshake or a hand grenade to be nation builders as well as warriors to help reestablish institutions and local security forces to assist in the rebuilding of infrastructure and basic services and to facilitate the establishment of local governance and the rule of law the list of such tasks is a long one and involves extensive coordination and cooperation with a myriad of intergovernmental indigenous and international agencies indeed the responsibilities of leaders in a counterinsurgency campaign are daunting and the discussions in this manual endeavor to alert them to the challenges of such campaigns and to suggest general approaches for grappling with those challenges conducting a successful counterinsurgency campaign thus requires a flexible adaptive force led by agile well informed culturally astute leaders it is our hope that this manual provides the necessary guidelines to succeed in such a campaign in operations that inevitably are exceedingly difficult and complex our soldiers deserve nothing less

this book is a rare and important study on the people and many of the groups and activist regions involved in the cuban insurrection of the 1950s it addresses the insurgent movement how people were drawn into the struggle the structure of the movement including its different activist groups and how rebels operated effectively and the role women played in this struggle it sheds light on the localized and social aspects of the struggle a topic that relatively little has been written on the cultural relational emotional and experiential factors that affected activists value formation and recruitment are also investigated

crude oil extraction in the niger delta region of nigeria generates 96 of all foreign earnings and 85 of state revenues making it crucial to the survival of the nigerian state several generations of state neglect corruption and mismanagement have ensured that the delta region is one of the most socio economically and politically deprived in the country by the late 1990s there was a frightening proliferation of armed gangs and insurgent groups illegal oil bunkering pipeline vandalism disruption of oil production activities riots and demonstrations intensified and in 2003 insurgents began kidnapping oil workers at a frenetic pace in late 2005 an uber insurgent movement organization was formed in nigeria christened the movement for the emancipation of the niger delta mend it operates as an amorphous multifaceted amalgam of insurgent groups with an unprecedented clinical precision in execution of intents by focussing on kidnappings that are putatively connected to the struggle for emancipating the niger delta oriola makes the case for analysing mend as a social movement organization rather than a terrorist or criminal gang by showing how political processes shape kidnappings in the delta the

use of violent repertoires of contention has not garnered sufficient attention in the social movement literature despite the fact that around the world many similar groups are adopting violent tactics without necessarily eschewing non violent techniques based on multi actor research including interviews and focus group discussions with community members military authorities 42 ex insurgents directly involved in illegal oil bunkering and kidnapping and official email statements from jomo gbomo the spokesperson of mend this book will be of interest to sociologists political scientists and peace and security studies scholars

this title was first published in 2002 this work uses the concept of the arms dynamic to identify and assess the various factors which influenced arms acquisitions of southeast asian states during the second cold war period from 1979 to 1989 providing an essential basis for understanding contemporary developments the book provides a comprehensive and systematic explanation of the reasons for arms purchases in se asia during the 1980s and aims to fill a gap in the literature by fully exploring arms procurement processes in the region prior to the end of the cold war

why have militaries so often failed to learn from conflict and war why for example despite years of unsuccessful counterinsurgency experiences in vietnam and el salvador and repeated recommendations from official army studies has the u s army not changed its doctrine for counterinsurgency writing for scholars as well as military professionals and policymakers downie examines the sources of doctrinal change and innovation from a theoretical perspective and derives practical and relevant policy recommendations contrasting with other findings in this field downie provides case studies showing that neither external pressure on a military nor institutional recognition of the requirement for doctrinal change is sufficient to explain the process of doctrinal change a military innovates when it learns by proceeding through a learning cycle that includes achieving an organizational consensus that permits adoption of new approaches that respond to factors that make existing doctrine deficient when that process is blocked militaries are left with outmoded doctrinal approaches that constrain military performance and lead to defeat this is an important study for military leaders civilian policymakers and scholars and researchers dealing with contemporary u s military issues
