Part 4 further considers toxicology's presence via the internet, databases and software tools, among the miscellaneous topics. In the concluding part 5, are laws and regulations, professional education, grants and funding, and patents. Volume 2, the global arena, offers contributed chapters focusing on the toxicology contributions of over 40 countries, followed by a glossary of toxicological terms and an appendix of popular quotations related to the field.
