Comprehension Definition The ability to understand and make meaning from what is read Importance Comprehending text is the foundation for critical thinking and analysis Strategies 2 Active reading Engage with the text by asking questions summarizing and highlighting key ideas Textual evidence Identify and use specific passages to support inferences and conclusions Visualization Create mental images based on the text to enhance understanding

II Critical Reading Skills Analysis Definition Breaking down a text into its component parts to understand its structure purpose and meaning Importance Analysis allows students to identify the main ideas supporting arguments and authors perspective Strategies Identifying the text structure Recognize patterns such as causeandeffect compareand contrast or problemsolution Analyzing authors purpose and tone Consider why the author wrote the text and what message they aim to convey Identifying key themes and ideas Determine the central concepts and arguments presented Inference Definition Drawing conclusions based on evidence from the text and prior knowledge Importance Inference allows students to make connections predict outcomes and understand implied meanings Strategies Identifying clues and hints Look for words phrases and details that suggest underlying meanings Making connections to prior knowledge Relate the text to personal experiences other texts or current events Considering authors purpose and perspective Understand how the authors viewpoint might influence their choices and interpretations Evaluation Definition Making judgments about the quality and effectiveness of the text Importance Evaluation helps students form informed opinions and critically assess information Strategies Identifying strengths and weaknesses Consider the texts clarity accuracy logic and persuasiveness Assessing the authors credibility Evaluate the source and authors qualifications 3 Considering the texts impact and relevance Assess its significance and how it relates to the larger context III Reading for Specific Purposes Research Reading Definition Reading to gather information for a specific purpose such as writing a report or essay Importance Research reading requires focused attention critical evaluation of sources and effective notetaking Strategies Skimming and scanning Quickly identify relevant information and key ideas Taking effective notes Record main points supporting details and key quotes Evaluating sources for credibility and reliability Consider authors expertise publication date and source bias Literary Analysis Definition Reading to analyze the literary elements and techniques used by authors Importance Literary analysis requires close
