Narrative Voice The distinctive voice or style of the narrator. This includes tone, diction, and perspective.

Example: The cynical and ironic narrative voice in *Catch-22*.

Theme The underlying message or idea explored in a story. It's the deeper meaning behind the plot.

Example: Themes of revenge, betrayal, and justice are central to *Hamlet*.

II. Character

Character A person, animal, or entity in a story. Characters can be protagonists, main characters, antagonists, opposing characters, or supporting characters.
