focuses on a range of jewish and non jewish writers to examine the intersection of kabbalah the jewish mystical tradition and secular jewish literatures kabbalah and literature shows how the jewish mystical tradition contributes to the renewal of literature in a modern global and increasingly disconnected age kitty millet explores kabbalah s conceptual underpinnings aesthetic principles tenets and signifiers to demonstrate how literature s absorption of kabbalistic material has altered its ontology function and the tasks it sets for itself reading writers from europe and the americas kitty millet maps how the kabbalist s desire to recover eden transforms into a latent messianic drive only intuitable through text thus it charts a journey of sorts a migration of jewish mystical material embedded surreptitiously within text in order to shift ever so slightly at times the range of the literary to encompass an aesthetic vision not easily reducible to the literal the known the allegorical or even the philosophical in this way kabbalah and literature proposes a novel intuitive approach shifting focus away from the jewish text s epistemological elements to embrace its secrets

with globalization studies and how industries to do with the circulation of literature are becoming globalized this book is intended for university level students and teachers researchers and other informed readers with an interest in the above issues and serves as both a survey of the field and an intervention within it book jacket

ecocriticism is a critical approach that focuses on the representation in literature of the non human elements of the natural world a method of inquiry that has been largely limited to literature written in english the aim of ecocritical approaches to literature in french is twofold to introduce ecocriticism to scholars of french language literature and to open ecocriticism to the vision and voices of french literature the chapters look at work not only from france but also from north america the caribbean and africa the discussions include fiction poetry film and pedagogy the goal of the collection is to demonstrate not only the applicability of ecocritical inquiry to literature in french but to demonstrate the possibilities of

ecocritical theory on the study of french literature and also for ecocriticism itself this collection will be a useful resource both for scholars of french language literature and also for ecocritics who may have had only limited contact with literatures in languages other than english

this book takes a fresh look at the relations between literature and biography by tracing the history of their connections through three hundred years of french literature the starting point for this history is the eighteenth century when the term biography first entered the french language and when the word literature began to acquire its modern sense of writing marked by an aesthetic character arguing that the idea of literature is inherently open to revision and contestation ann jefferson examines the way in which biographically orientated texts have been engaged in questioning and revising definitions of literature at the same time she tracks the evolving forms of biographical writing in french culture and proposes a reappraisal of biography in terms not only of its forms but also of its functions although ann jefferson s book has powerful theoretical implications for both biography and the literary it is first and foremost a history offering a comprehensive new account of the development of french literature through this dual focus on the question of literature and on the relations between literature and biography it offers original readings of major authors and texts in the light of these concerns beginning with rousseau and ending with life writing contemporary authors such as pierre michon and jacques roubaud other authors discussed include mme de stäel victor hugo sainte beuve barbey d aurevilly baudelaire nerval mallarmé schwob proust gide leiris sartre genet barthes and roger laporte

endurance of genres styles concepts techniques symbolisms and idioms derived from tibet s rich and diverse oral art forms and textual traditions it reveals how tibetan kavya poetics the mgur genre life writing the gesar epic and other modes of oral and literary compositions are referenced and adapted in novel ways within modern tibetan poetry and fiction it also brings to prominence the complex and fertile interplay between orality and the tibetan literary text embracing a multidisciplinary approach drawing on theoretical insights in western literary theory and criticism political studies sociology and anthropology this research shows that alongside literary and oral continuities the tibetan nation proves to be an inevitable attribute of modern tibetan literature

in the eighteenth century literature meant learned writings by the twentieth century literature had come to be identified with imaginative aesthetically significant works and academic literary studies had developed special protocols for interpreting and valuing literary texts literature in the making examines what happened in between how literature came to be more precisely specified and valued how it was organized into genres canons and national traditions and how it became the basis for departments of modern languages and literatures in research universities modern literature the version of literature familiar today was an international invention but it was forged when literary cultures traditions and publishing industries were mainly organized nationally literature in the making examines modern literature s coalescence and institutionalization in the united states considered as an instructive instance of a phenomenon that was going global since modern literature initially offered a way to formulate the value of legacy texts by authors such as homer cervantes and shakespeare however the development of literature and literary culture in the u s was fundamentally transnational literature in the making argues that shakespeare studies one of the richest tracts of nineteenth century u s literary culture was a key domain in which literature came to be valued both for fuelling modern projects and for safeguarding values and practices that modernity put at risk a foundational paradox that continues to shape literary studies and literary culture bringing together the histories of literature s competing conceptualizations its print infrastructure its changing status in higher education and its life in public culture during the long nineteenth century literature in the making offers a robust account of how and why literature mattered then and matters now by highlighting the lively collaboration between academics and non academics that prevailed before the ascendancy of the research university starkly divided experts from amateurs literature in the making also opens new possibilities for envisioning how academics might partner with the reading public
