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the history of textiles more than that of any other artefact is a history of human ingenuity from the very earliest needles of 50 000 years ago to the smart textiles of today textiles have been fundamental to human existence and enjoyed prized and valued by every culture silks from china cottons from india tapestries from flanders dyes from south america the appeal of different weaves colours and patterns was long a motivation for trade the exchange of ideas and sometimes even war mary schoesers groundbreaking book now revised and updated to incorporate new research presents a chronological survey of textiles around the world from prehistory to the present it explores how they are made what they are made from how they function in society and the ways in which they are

valued and given meaning as well as reflecting on the environmental challenges they present today world textiles offers an invaluable introduction to this vast and fascinating subject for makers designers textile and fashion professionals collectors and students alike

dress is at the core of dance it adorns dancers defines various roles and forms symbolic expressions that for example either bind people together or opposes them it is a communicative tool that gives crucial information for understanding the dance as well as the culture and the sociological effects of a group of people as such dress transcends how it is seen visually to address what is being communicated nonetheless studies in ancient dance have rarely taken clothing into consideration therefore this publication gathers articles that give new perspectives and insights on ancient dances and their ancient textiles comprehension of ancient dance benefits from investigations undertaken through the lens of dress and research on ancient dress is understood through its relation to body movement and performative rituals thus reinforcing the progressive integration of an anthropological and sociological dimension into historical analysis of ancient textiles for the first time the two way transfer of knowledge between dance studies and costume studies is connected via an innovative approach among the issues that are specifically addressed are the movement design of dress for dance its sensory experience gender and identity reenactment and reception the chronological range of the publication is limited to the ancient world 3rd millennium bc to 5th century ad and the geographical definition is meant to be broad in order to promote a comparative approach and cross cultural dialogue as well as discourse between fields and disciplines

the theme of weaving a powerful metaphor within anglo saxon studies and old english literature itself unites the essays collected here they range from consideration of interwoven sources in homiletic prose and a word weaving poet to woven riddles and iconographical textures in medieval art and show how weaving has the power to represent textiles texts and textures both literal and metaphorical in the early medieval period they thus form an appropriate tribute to professor gale r owen crocker whose own scholarship has focussed on exploring woven works of textile and dress manuscripts and text and other arts of the anglo saxon peoples

a richly illustrated history of textiles in the mughal empire in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries a vast array of textiles circulated throughout the mughal empire made from rare fibers and crafted using virtuosic techniques these exquisite objects animated early modern experience from the intimate

sensory pleasure of garments to the monumentality of imperial tents the art of cloth in mughal india tells the story of textiles crafted and collected across south asia and beyond illuminating how cloth participated in political negotiations social conversations and the shared seasonal rhythms of the year drawing on small scale paintings popular poetry chronicle histories and royal inventory records sylvia houghteling charts the travels of textiles from the mughal imperial court to the kingdoms of rajasthan the deccan sultanates and the british isles she shows how the art of cloth encompassed both the making of textiles as well as their creative uses houghteling asks what cloth made its wearers feel how it acted in space and what images and memories it conjured in the mind she reveals how woven objects began to evoke the natural environment convey political and personal meaning and span the distance between faraway people and places beautifully illustrated the art of cloth in mughal india offers an incomparable account of the aesthetics and techniques of cloth and cloth making and the ways that textiles shaped the social political religious and aesthetic life of early modern south asia

a richly illustrated history of embroidery and needlework showcasing the glorious range of styles motifs and materials used around the world embroidery is one of the world s most widely shared forms of creative expression and one of its most varied and diverse it can be found in every region yet its visual languages themes and techniques vary greatly some are marked by unique styles and others show influences from neighboring cultures the atlas of world embroidery examines many distinctive embroidery styles and traditions found across the americas europe africa asia and australasia from the quillwork and birch boxes of indigenous north america to the decorative matyo style of hungary the zardozi embroiderers of india and the satin stitches of han dynasty china gillian vogelsang eastwood provides a comprehensive history of embroidery describing its materials and tools its designs and symbols and its uses and makers emphasizing the visual aspects of embroidery across cultures the atlas features an unprecedented array of color images celebrating the art form organized geographically by region and country and focusing on hand needlework with relevant examples of machine forms the atlas of world embroidery is a beautiful and authoritative exploration of this ancient craft lavishly illustrated throughout in full color with more than 300 images features full and close up images of embroidered fabrics including household items and clothing along with insightful analysis includes sections on the americas europe sub saharan africa the arabic world turkey the iranian plateau and central asia the indian subcontinent east asia and southeast asia and australasia with subsections on individual countries cultures and kinds of embroidery contains a directory of

since the discovery of coptic textile in the course of late 19th and early 20th century excavations in egypt they have found their way into major museums throughout the world they represent skilled craftsmanship highly developed weaving techniques and artistry in pattern as well as colour and have been an inspiration to many artists including rodin and matisse who were both collectors
