effie bendann offers an analytical study of burial rites and associated ideas in melanesia australia northeast siberia and india this book is divided in two parts part one looks at the similarities in rites and ideas while part two examines the differences topics include cause of death mourning purification taboos women s connection with funeral rites and the cult of the dead

describing a variety of funeral ritual from major world religions and from local traditions this book shows how cultures cope not only with corpses but also create an added value for living through the growth of afterlife beliefs the key theme of the book is the rhetoric of death the way cultures use the most potent weapon of words to bring new power to life human identity and its transformation through mortuary rites is explored through the mummies of chile and egypt african sacrificial deaths indian cremations immigrant cemeteries in the usa ancestor rites in eastern religions and mormonism and the freezing of the dead in cryonics research findings are presented on cremation and afterlife beliefs especially reincarnation sensing the presence of the dead and the death of pets in britain to show how mortuary rituals are constantly changing in response to death as a major feature of the human environment

do funerals matter is a creative interweaving of historical sociocultural and research based perspectives on death rituals drawing from myriad sources to create a picture of what death rituals have been and where especially in the western world they are going the classic edition includes a new preface from the author reflecting on changes in the field since the book s initial publication death educators researchers counselors clergy funeral service professionals and others will appreciate the book s theory and research based approach to the ways in which different cultural groups memorialize their dead they will also find clear clinical and practical applications in the author s exploration of the five ritual anchors of death related ceremonial practice

and help for professionals counseling the bereaved surrounding funerals based on nearly four decades of research and teaching on funeral rites this volume promises to fill an important gap in the cross cultural literature on bereavement while answering an important question for our generation do funerals matter

during the late imperial era 1500 1911 china though divided by ethnic linguistic and regional differences at least as great as those prevailing in europe enjoyed a remarkable solidarity what held chinese society together for so many centuries some scholars have pointed to the institutional control over the written word as instrumental in promoting cultural homogenization others the manipulation of the performing arts this volume comprised of essays by both anthropologists and historians furthers this important discussion by examining the role of death rituals in the unification of chinese culture

this book describes and analyses the structure and performance of tibetan buddhist death rituals and situates that performance within the wider context of buddhist death practices generally drawing on a detailed and systematic comparative survey of existing records of tibetan funerary practices including historical travel accounts anthropological and ethnographic literature tibetan texts and academic studies it demonstrates that there is no standard form of funeral in tibetan buddhism although certain elements are common the structure of the book follows the twin trajectories of benefiting the deceased and protecting survivors in the process it reveals a rich and complex panoply of activities some handled by religious professionals and others by lay persons this information is examined to identify similarities and differences in practices and the degree to which tibetan buddhist funeral practices are consistent with the mortuary rituals of other forms of buddhism a number of elements in these death rites which at first appear to be unique to tibetan buddhism may only be tibetan in their surface characteristics while having roots in practices which pre date the transmission of buddhism to tibet filling a gap in the existing literature on tibetan buddhism this book poses research challenges that will engage future scholars in the field of buddhism tibetan buddhism and anthropology

every culture has found ways of living life differently each has also found different and sometimes extraordinary ways to deal with dying and the effects that it has on the people left behind this book examines the subject of death and burial in varied cultures societies and ages covering all periods in history and religions the book also examines the differing approaches to funerals whether solemn celebratory drunken or even sexually promiscuous it illuminates the combination between the earthly and spiritual in funeral rites the practices of human sacrifice and ritual killing as well as grieving burial cremation remembrance and the differing concepts of life after death includes 120 stunning photos and illustrations from death and funerary rituals

winner of the afs elli köngäs maranda prize 2016 multidisciplinary or post disciplinary research is what is needed when dealing with such complex subjects as ritual behaviour this research therefore combines ethnography with historical sources to examine the relationship between modern greek death rituals and ancient written and visual sources on the subject of death and gender the central theme of this work is women s role in connection with the cult of the dead in ancient and modern greece the research is based on studies in ancient history combined with the author s fieldwork and anthropological analysis of today s mediterranean societies since death rituals have a focal and lasting importance and reflect the gender relations within a society the institutions surrounding death may function as a critical vantage point from which to view society the comparison is based on certain religious festivals that are dedicated to deceased persons and on other death rituals using laments burials and the ensuing memorial rituals the relationship between the cult dedicated to deceased mediators in both ancient and modern society is analysed the research shows how the official ideological rituals are influenced by the domestic rituals people perform for their own dead and vice versa that the modern domestic rituals simultaneously reflect the public performances as this cult has many parallels with the ancient official cult the following questions are central can an analysis of modern public and

domestic rituals in combination with ancient sources tell the reader more about the ancient death cult as a whole what does such an analysis suggest about the relationship between the domestic death cult and the official since the practical performance of the domestic rituals was and still remains in the hands of women it is crucial to discover the extent of their influence to elucidate the real power relations between women and men this research represents a new contribution to earlier presentations of the greek reality but mainly from the female perspective which is highly significant since men produced most of the ancient sources this means that the principal objective for this endeavour is to question the ways in which history has been written through the ages to supplement the male with a female perspective perhaps complementing an olympian zeus with a chthonic mother earth the research brings both ancient and modern worlds into mutual illumination its relevance therefore transcends the greek context both in time and space

process which will enable the burial to take place quickly easily and most importantly in accordance with shari'ah some of the subjects we will cover are as follows what do we do when we see someone passing away what legal paperwork do we need to go through with the burial how to prepare the kafan shroud and bathe the body of the deceased the correct burial process according to shari'ah the period of mourning and information on 'iddah etiquettes of visiting the house of the deceased what can we do for those who have passed away

the forms by which a deceased person may be brought to rest are as many as there are causes of death in most societies the disposal of the corpse is accompanied by some form of celebration or ritual which may range from a simple act of deportment in solitude to the engagement of large masses of people in laborious and creative festivities in a funerary context the term ritual may be taken to represent a process that incorporates all the actions performed and thoughts expressed in connection with a dying and dead person from the preparatory pre death stages to the final deposition of the corpse and the post mortem stages of grief and commemoration the contributions presented here are focused not on the examination of different funerary practices their function and meaning but on the changes of such rituals how and when they occurred and how they may be explained based on case studies from a range of geographical regions and from different

prehistoric and historical periods a range of key themes are examined concerning belief and ritual body and deposition place performance and commemoration exploring a complex web of practices
