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how is social action related to aesthetics and anthropology to theatre what is the meaning of such concepts as work play liminal and flow in this highly influential book turner elaborates on ritual and theatre persona and individual role playing and performing taking examples from american european and african societies for a greater understanding of culture and its symbols

growing out of a series of articles written over a 15 year period and illustrated with over 100 photos this volume offers a narrowed focus examination of various performing traditions that rely on the expressive power and imagination of masks it explores the redefinition of self into other when the mask is worn and examines actors and their performances in papua new guinea orissa india and bali

the field of performance studies embraces performance behaviour of all kinds and in all contexts from everyday life to high ceremony this volume investigates a wide range of performance behaviour dance ritual conflict situation sports storytelling and display behaviour in a variety of circumstances and cultures it considers such issues as the relationship between training and the finished performance whether performance behaviour is universal or culturally specific and the relationships between ritual aesthetics popular entertainment and religion and sports and theatre and dance the volume brings together essays from leading anthropologists artists and performance theorists to provide a definitive introduction to the burgeoning field of performance studies it will be of value to scholars teachers and students of anthropology theatre folklore semiotics and performance studies

late medieval and renaissance cities though powerful communities jealous of their own jurisdiction were constantly negotiating their relationships with other secular and religious authorities the seven essays in this collection treat various aspects of civic display and pageantry during the 15th and 16th centuries discussing a variety of discourse genres

this book in two volumes breathes fresh air empirically methodologically and theoretically into understanding the rich ceremonial lives the philosophical religious knowledge and the impressive material feats and labor organization that distinguish hopewell indians of central ohio and neighboring regions during the first centuries ce the first volume defines cross culturally for the first time the ritual drama as a genre of social performance it reconstructs and compares parts of 14 such dramas that hopewellian and other woodland period peoples performed in their ceremonial centers to help the soul like essences of their deceased make the journey to an afterlife the second volume builds and critiques ten formal cross cultural models of personhood and the self and infers the nature of scioto hopewell people s ontology two facets of their ontology are found to have been instrumental in their creating the intercommunity alliances and cooperation and gathering the labor required to construct their huge multicomunity ceremonial centers a relational collective concept of the self defined by the ethical quality of the relationships one has with other beings and a concept of multiple soul like essences that compose a human being and can be harnessed strategically to create familial like ethical bonds of cooperation among individuals and communities the archaeological reconstructions of hopewellian ritual dramas and concepts of personhood and the self and of hopewell people s strategic uses of these are informed by three large surveys of

historic woodland and plains indians narratives ideas and rites about journeys to afterlives the creatures who inhabit the cosmos and the nature and functions of soul like essences coupled with rich contextual archaeological and bioarchaeological taphonomic analyses the bioarchaeological taphonomic method of I anthropologie de terrain new to north american archaeology is introduced and applied in all the research in this book vitalizes a vision of an anthropology committed to native logic and motivation and skeptical of the imposition of western world views and categories onto native peoples

in this study a cross over is made between two fields of inquiry a theoretical model from anthropology communitas will be applied to the phenomenon of classical greek theater the purpose of this cross over is to gain a better understanding of the functionality of theater in 5th century athens it is primarily the intention of this new reading of ancient comedy and tragedy to offer a contribution to a more correct interpretation of ancient literary texts thus this book will show itself useful in the field of traditional philology secondly the study wants to show itself useful in the field of anthropology by giving examples from antiquity underlining and clarifying the theories of van gennep and turner from an anthropological point of view it is interesting to see that turner s findings not only clarify the functionality of non theatrical rituals but also the workings of theatrical rituals

the topic of the origins of theatre is one of the most controversial in theatre studies with a long history of heated discussions and strongly held positions in the roots of theatre eli rozik enters the debate in a feisty way offering not just another challenge to those who place theatre s origins in ritual and religion but also an alternative theory of roots based on the cultural and psychological conditions that made the advent of theatre possible rozik grounds his study in a comprehensive review and criticism of each of the leading historical and anthropological theories he believes that the quest for origins is essentially misleading because it does not provide any significant insight for our understanding of theatre instead he argues

that theatre like music or dance is a *sui generis* kind of human creativity a form of thinking and communication whose roots lie in the spontaneous image making faculty of the human psyche. rozik's broad approach to research lies within the boundaries of structuralism and semiotics but he also utilizes additional disciplines such as psychoanalysis, neurology, sociology, play and game theory, science of religion, mythology, poetics, philosophy of language and linguistics in seeking the roots of theatre. what he ultimately defines is something substantial about the nature of creative thought a rudimentary system of imagistic thinking and communication that lies in the set of biological, primitive and infantile phenomena such as daydreaming, imaginative play, children's drawing, imitation, mockery, caricature, parody, storytelling and mythmaking.

the ritual theatre of theodoros terzopoulos outlines the story of the athenian based attis theatre and the way its founder and director theodoros terzopoulos introduced bio energetic presences of the body on the stage in an attempt to redefine and reappraise what it means today not only to have a body but to fully be a body. terzopoulos created a very specific attitude towards life and death and it is this broad perspective on energy and consciousness that makes his work so appealing both to a general public and to students of arts theatre and drama. freddy decreus study charts the career of greece's most acclaimed theatre director and provides a spiritual and philosophic answer in times where former western meta narratives have failed.

the senior lecturer of drama theatre and performance at the university of huddersfield and artistic director of the urban research theater ben spatz explores the various dimensions of ritual, ritual theatre and ritual in theatre and their development.

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
