african american slave narratives of the 19th century recorded the atrocities of the antebellum south and provided a solid foundation for the african american literary tradition by presenting 16 slave narratives in their entirety this reference conveniently documents this historically significant literary genre a vivid and moving history of african americans seeking to establish community liberty economic independence and education within the constraints of a repressive society this reference intentionally avoids well known narratives and instead collects unavailable and otherwise difficult to find texts to add to the value of the work for researchers and general readers alike each narrative is accompanied by a preface explanatory notes and suggestions for further reading many of the narratives gathered here were influential when initially published josiah henson s presentation of himself for example embodies many of the characteristics given to uncle tom by harriet beecher stowe in her novel uncle tom s cabin while other collections often only provide excerpts from widely available texts this reference includes complete narratives the introductions and annotations redefine current thinking in the field by closely examining how these authors used language structured their writing and

crafted their autobiographies by examining the historical cultural literary and social issues that african americans have faced since their arrival this reference provides the broad context necessary to understand the literary historical and intellectual traditions from which these writings developed

these autobiographies of afro american ex slaves comprise the largest body of literature produced by slaves in human history the book consists of three sections selected reviews of slave narratives dating from 1750 to 1861 essays examining how such narratives serve as historical material and essays exploring the narratives as literary artifacts

relating the blues to american social and literary history and to afro american expressive culture houston a baker jr offers the basis for a broader study of american culture at its vernacular level he shows how the blues voice and its economic undertones are both central to the american narrative and characteristic of the afro american way of telling it

to tell a free story traces in unprecedented detail the history of black america s most innovative literary tradition the autobiography from its beginnings to the end of the slavery era

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characterized by oral expression and ritual performance the black church has been a dynamic force in african american culture in the sermon and the african american literary imagination dolan hubbard explores the profound influence of the sermon upon both the themes and the styles of african american literature beginning with an exploration of the historic role of the preacher in african american culture and fiction hubbard examines the church as a forum for organizing black social reality like political speeches jazz and blues the sermon is an aesthetic construct interrelated with other aspects of african american cultural expression arguing that the african american sermonic tradition is grounded in a self consciously collective vision hubbard applies this vision to the themes and patterns of black american literature with nuanced readings of the work of frederick douglass frances ellen watkins harper james weldon johnson zora neale hurston ralph ellison james baldwin and toni morrison hubbard reveals how the african american sermonic tradition has influenced black american prose fiction he shows how african american writers have employed the forms of the black preaching style with all their expressive power and he explores such recurring themes as the quest for freedom and literacy the search for identity and community the lure of upward mobility the fictionalizing of history and the use of romance to transform an oppressive history into a vision of mythic transcendence the sermon and the african american literary imagination is a major addition to the fields of african american literary and religious studies book jacket title summary field provided by blackwell north america inc all rights reserved

the book argues that from its very beginnings african american journey narratives are distinctively non teleological that is they typically resist being directed toward an end point in a particular place and instead exult in movement through indefinite space they view movement as intrinsically valuable a process of endless becoming rather than a carefully mapped journey resulting in a completed state of being rooted in a fixed place as such these journeys are a compelling metaphor of the american desire for the new life consisting of unlimited personal development the writers examined in this book offer a unique set of variations on this kind of open journey

thesis m a from the year 2015 in the subject american studies literature grade 1 3 university of frankfurt main institut für england und amerikastudien language english abstract the purpose of this thesis is to illuminate the manner in which violence is represented in two significant afro american autobiographies frederick douglass narrative of the life of frederick douglass an american slave hereafter shortened as narrative and richard wright s black boy as afro american autobiography has always been a mirror to u s society it will be interesting to see how these autobiographies taken from different periods of american history deal with the race oriented problem of violence as we will see the very first afro american autobiographies so called slave narratives already included representations of violence that documented the atrocities that black people had to endure remarkably richard wright s black boy shares many textual features of the slave narratives such as the escape from the south after a traumatizing experience of violence

deals extensively with the african american experience in the united states from the very beginning up to the present day with an in depth examination of the history and contributions of a people who want to be recognized

fully updated this edition provides a range of historical and current information on african american history society and culture and includes coverage of such topics as the african diaspora landmarks organizations populations family inventors and scientists and religious traditions

in early twentieth century motion picture houses offensive stereotypes of african americans were as predictable as they were prevalent watermelon eating chicken thievery savages with uncontrollable appetites sambo and zip coon were all representations associated with african american people most of these caricatures were rendered by whites in blackface few people realize that from 1915 through 1929 a number of african american film directors worked diligently to counter such racist definitions of black manhood found in films like d w griffith s the birth of a nation the 1915 epic that glorified the ku klux klan in the wake of the film s phenomenal success african american filmmakers sought to defend and redefine black manhood through motion pictures gerald butters s comprehensive study of the african american cinematic vision in silent film concentrates on works largely ignored by most contemporary film scholars african american produced and directed films and white independent productions of all black features using these race movies to explore the construction of masculine identity and the use of race in popular culture he separates cinematic myth from historical reality the myth of the euro american controlled cinematic portrayal of black men versus the actual black male experience through intense archival research butters reconstructs many lost films expanding the discussion of race and representation beyond the debate about good and bad imagery to explore the construction of masculine identity and the use of race as device in the context of western popular culture he particularly examines the filmmaking of oscar Micheaux the most prolific and

controversial of all african american silent film directors and creator of the recently rediscovered within our gates the legendary film that exposed a virtual litany of white abuses toward blacks black manhood on the silent screen is unique in that it takes contemporary and original film theory applies it to the distinctive body of african american independent films in the silent era and relates the meaning of these films to larger political social and intellectual events in american society by showing how both white and black men have defined their own sense of manhood through cinema it examines the intersection of race and gender in the movies and offers a deft interweaving of film theory american history and film history

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
