this is the second of the two closely linked but self contained volumes that comprise james hurford s acclaimed exploration of the biological evolution of language in the first book he looked at the evolutionary origins of meaning ending as our distant ancestors were about to step over the brink to modern language he now considers how that step might have been taken and the consequences it undoubtedly had the capacity for language lets human beings formulate and express an unlimited range of propositions about real or fictitious worlds it allows them to communicate these propositions often overlaid with layers of nuance and irony to other humans who can then interpret and respond to them these processes take place at breakneck speed using a language means learning a vast number of arbitrary connections between forms and meanings and rules on how to manipulate them both of which a normal human child can do in its first few years of life james hurford looks at how this miracle came about the book is divided into three parts in the first the author surveys the syntactic structures evident in the communicative behaviour of animals such as birds and whales and discusses how vocabularies of learned symbols could have evolved and the effects this had on human thought in the second he considers how far the evolution of grammar depended on biological or cultural factors in the third and final part he describes the probable route by which the human language faculty and languages evolved from simple beginnings to their present complex state

learning a foreign language is much easier when it is approached with a knowledge of language structure grammar but many students find grammar mystifying this text explains points of grammar straightforwardly using examples from several widely studied languages including english so that students can see how the same principles work across different languages and how the structures of different languages correspond both formally and functionally the use of concrete examples makes grammar less abstract and easier to grasp allowing students to relate what they are learning to knowledge that they already possess unconsciously it simultaneously brings that knowledge up to a conscious level

a shortened version of a comprehensive grammar of the english language especially aimed at students of grammar in colleges and universities drawing on linguistic research and including coverage of the differences between written and spoken english and between british and american english

this conversational self reflective guide helps readers understand the social judgments that accompany language use making them feel they are active

participants in shaping their language rather than passive victims of grammar rules that someone imposes on them supplementing traditional grammar terms with insights gained by modern linguistic analysis it describes english as an instrument of communication and lays the necessary groundwork for thinking about language so users can apply their knowledge of language in ways most useful to them explores the basics of english beginning with a discussion of the development of a standard english language and the origins of our present day rules of english and attitudes towards usa initiates the study of grammar emphasizing the complex interaction between language rules and behavior talks about how one approaches the study of the structure of a language and finally works from the lowest levels of grammatical organization to the highest starting with an analysis of words and working up to the level of the sentence offers many different types of exercises that encourage readers to think talk and write about english in real world contexts with increasing confidence and sophistication for writers communications professionals and anyone interested in acquiring a better understanding of how the english language works

taking a broadly chronological approach this volume of original essays traces the origins of the concept of grammar in doing so it charts the social moral and cultural factors that have shaped the development of grammar from antiquity via the middle ages renaissance and modern europe to current education systems and language learning pedagogy the chapters examine key turning points in the history of language teaching epistemology focusing on grammar for language teaching across different european cultural contexts bringing together leading scholars of classical and modern languages education the history of grammar in foreign language teaching offers the first single source reference on the evolving concept of grammar across cultural and linguistic borders in western language education it therefore represents a valuable resource for teachers teacher educators and course designers as well as students and scholars of historical linguistics and of second and foreign language education
