most people know of valhalla the world tree and the gods of norse mythology or the strange hunts and voyages of the ancient Irish tales yet few people realise the significance of the similarities and contrasts between the religions of the pre christian people of north western europe the celts and germans and scandinavians had much in common in their religious practices and beliefs and this is the first serious attempt that has been made to compare them there are striking resemblances in their ideas about battle goddesses and protective spirits holy places sacrificial rituals divination and ideas about the other world and myths and symbols in pagan europe poses questions like do such parallels go back to early times or are they owing to late viking contact hilda ellis davidson has worked for many years on pre christian scandinavian and germanic religion and now compares them with the celts from the background of previous studies using evidence from archaeology iconography later literature and folklore in a search for basic patterns which will add to our knowledge of the early peoples in europe aimed at teachers and libraries but also accessible to students of history religion and celtic norse and german languages and cultures

surveys the pre christian beliefs of the scandinavian and germanic peoples provides an introduction to this subject giving basic outlines to the sagas and stories and helps identify the character traits of not only the well known but also the lesser gods of the age

while much work has been done on goddesses of the ancient world and the male gods of pre christian scandinavia the northern goddesses have been largely neglected roles of the northern goddess presents a highly readable study of the worship of these goddesses by men and women with its use of evidence from early literature popular tradition legend and archaeology this book investigates the role of the early hunting goddess and the local goddesses who were involved in all aspects of the household and the farm what emerges is that the goddess was both benevolent and destructive a powerful figure closely concerned with birth and death and with destiny of individuals

our understanding of lycanthropy is limited by our association of it with contemporary portrayals of werewolves in horror films and gothic fiction no rational person today believes that a human being can literally be metamorphosed into a wolf therefore in the absence of an historical context the study of werewolves can appear to be a wayward pursuit of the perversely irrational and the sensational this reader provides the historical context drawing on primary sources it is a comprehensive survey of all aspects of lycanthropy with a focus on the medieval and renaissance periods lycanthropes were on trial in the courtrooms of europe and on examination in medical offices and mental hospitals they were the objects of communal fear and pity and the subjects of sermons and philosophical treatises in the introduction to the reader charlotte otten shows that the study of lycanthropy uncovers basic issues in human life the significance of violence and criminality the role of the demonic in aberrant behavior and ultimately the nature of good and evil the implications for modern life are immediately apparent the reader is divided into six sections i medical cases diagnoses descriptions 2 trial records historical accounts sightings 3 philosophical and theological approaches to metamorphosis 4 critical essays on lycanthropy anthropology history and medicine 5 myths and legends and 6 allegory each section has an introduction that summarizes and interprets the materials

katharine briggs made an indelible mark on the world of folklore with her compilation of the dictionary of british folktales in the english languages while her subsequent dictionary of fairies confirmed her already distinguished place among british folklorists briggs s initial academic interest while at oxford university was in seventeenth century literature and the civil war upon leaving oxford she pursued amateur dramatics and worked for the guide movement and during the second world war she served in the women s auxiliary air force it was here perhaps that her personality fully matured among other activities she delighted her fellows with her remarkable gift for story telling after the war her career as a folklorist began to blossom as if to make up for lost time she spent the last twenty years of her life writing and lecturing almost continually as well as her books on folklore she gained renown for her children s books kate crackernuts and hobberdy dick she was responsible for revitalising the folklore society and as its president she laid the foundations of the society as it is today hilda davidson s biography brings to life a remarkable woman whose combination of academic excellence and natural gift for narrative found her friends all over the world

katharine briggs enjoys an unchallenged reputation in the world of folklore studies the theme of this volume the witch figure as a malevolent intermediary in folk belief was chosen to reflect that aspect of briggs s scholarship exemplified in her study of witchcraft pale hecate s team the contributors draw on the disciplines of archaeology comparative religion sociology and literature and include carmen blacker h r ellis davidson margaret dean smith l v grinsell christina hole venetia newall geoffrey parrinder anne ross jacqueline simpson beatrice white john widdowson originally published in 1973

serpent and dragon symbolism is ubiquitous in the art and mythology of premodern cultures around the world over the centuries conflicting hypotheses have been proposed to interpret this symbolism which while illuminating have proved insufficient to the task of revealing a singular meaning for the vast majority of examples in the serpent symbol in tradition dr dailey argues that in what the symbolist rene guenon and the historian of religions mircea eliade have called traditional or archaic societies the serpent dragon transculturally symbolizes matter a state of being that is constituted by the perception of the physical world as chaotic in comparison to what traditional peoples believed to be the higher meta physical source of the physical world or nature in the course of dr dailey s investigations into the meaning of traditional serpent dragon symbolism the following contributions have proved invaluable 1 guenon s interpretation of the language of traditional symbolism and the metaphysics that underlies it as well as his interpretation of the terminology of the hindu doctrines 2 eliade s interpretation of traditional archaic societies by means of his concepts of chaos creation axis mundi world axis and sacred and profane and 3 the insights of various other researchers of serpent dragon symbolism beyond purporting to resolve some of the mystery of the ancient and varied symbolism of the serpent dragon

the serpent symbol in tradition strives to serve the related functions of interpreting the symbolic meanings of a wide variety of premodern artifacts and narratives as well as providing a study of the origination and ancient human awareness of the mentioned state of matter

in the early years of the thirteenth century the danish writer saxo grammaticus provided his people with a history of the danes an account of their glorious past from the legendary kings and heroes of denmark to the historical present it is one of the major sources for the heroic and mythological traditions of northern europe though the complex latin style and the wide range of material brought together from different sources have limited its use here hilda ellis davidson a specialist in scandinavian mythology together with the translator peter fisher provides a full english edition each of the first nine books is preceded by an introductory summary and a detailed commentary follows on the folklore and life and customs of twelfth century denmark including the sources of hamlet of which saxo gives the earliest known account hilda ellis davidson's other books include the sword in anglo saxon england peter fisher is also the translator of olaus magnus a description of the northern peoples both are available from boydell brewer in the early years of the 13th century the danish writer saxo grammaticus provided his people with a dignified and ambitious latin account of their glorious past from the mythical past to the historical present he collected the legends of scandinavian gods and heroes and arranged their exploits in a series of biographies which ostensibly formed an unbroken sequence he took his tales from a variety of sources and readers will find his collection of myths folklore and fabulous history fascinating an accurate and readable translation of the nine mythological books based on the best scholarly edition ruth morse british book news
