in his *plaint of nature de planctu naturae* alan of lille bases much of his argument against sin in general and homosexuality in particular on the claim that both amount to bad grammar the book explores the philosophical uses of grammar that were so formative of alan s thinking in major writers of the preceding generations including garland the computist st anselm and peter abelard many of the linguistic theories on which these thinkers rely come from priscian an influential sixth century grammarian who relied more on the ancient tradition of stoic linguistic theory than the aristotelian one in elaborating his grammatical theory against this backdrop the book provides a reading of prudentius *psychomachia* and presents an analysis of allegory in light of stoic linguistic theory that contrasts other modern theories of allegorical signification and readings of prudentius the book establishes that stoic linguistic theory is compatible with and likely partially formative of both the allegorical medium itself and the ideas expressed within it in particular as they appeared in the allegories of prudentius boethius and alan

taking gertrude stein zora neale hurston lydia davis and david foster wallace as key case studies lola boorman makes a series of compelling links between how american authors and intellectuals learned grammar through various diverse institutional settings and how they use it in their work to directly address structures of power authority democracy gender race and class drawing on the shifting discourses and definitions of grammar in academic disciplines literary and intellectual movements and para literary networks including linguistics anthropology language philosophy self help grammar books and school pedagogy the book charts the invisible yet ubiquitous role that grammar has played in literature and literary criticism and its embeddedness in systems of social and political power and conceptions of national identity

according to chomsky to learn a language is to develop a grammar for it a generative grammar which assigns a definite structure and a definite meaning to each of a definite set of sentences this forms the speaker's linguistic competence which represents a distinct faculty of the mind called the faculty of language this view has been widely criticised from many separate angles and by many different authors including some of chomsky's pupils as one of the earliest and most persistent critics professor matthews is especially well placed to tie these arguments together he concludes that chomsky's notion of competence finds no support within linguistics it can be defended if at all only by assuming a traditional philosophy of mind the notion of grammar should therefore be restricted to descriptive linguistics and should not have psychological interpretations foisted on it peter matthews

book covers a variety of topics from morphology to speech acts from word meaning to the study of language variation and from blending in syntax to the relation of language and culture this wide range of subject matter is incisively handled in a style which is both elegant and economical

this book shows how grammar helps people communicate and looks at the ways grammar and meaning interrelate the author starts from the notion that a speaker codes a meaning into grammatical forms which the listener is then able to recover each word he shows has its own meaning and each bit of grammar its own function their combinations creating and limiting the possibilities for different words he uncovers a rationale for the varying grammatical properties of different words and in the process explains many facts about english such as why we can say i wish to go i wish that he would go and i want to go but not i want that he would go the first part of the book reviews the main points of english syntax and discusses english verbs in terms of their semantic types including those of motion giving speaking liking and trying in the second part professor dixon looks at eight grammatical topics including complement clauses transitivity and causatives passives and the promotion of a non subject to subject as in dictionaries sell well this is the updated and revised edition of a new approach to english grammar on semantic principles it includes new chapters on tense and aspect nominalizations and possession and adverbs and negation and contains a new discussion of comparative forms of adjectives it also explains recent changes in english grammar including how they have replaced the tabooed he as a pronoun referring to either gender as in when a student reads this book they will learn a lot about english grammar in a most enjoyable manner
