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besides being the distinguished translator of murakami s work professor jay rubin is a self confessed fan he has now written a book for other fans who want to know more about the reclusive author of norwegian wood the wind up bird chronicle and the elephant vanishes

haruki murakami a global literary phenomenon has said that he started writing fiction as a means of self therapy what he has not discussed as much is what he needed self therapy for this book argues that by understanding more about why murakami writes and by linking this with the question of how he writes readers can better understand what he writes murakami s fiction in other words can be read as a search for self therapy in five chapters which explore murakami s fourteen novels to date this book argues that there are four prominent therapeutic threads woven through murakami s fiction that can be traced back to his personal traumas most notably murakami s falling out with his late father and the death of a former girlfriend and which have also transcended them in

significant ways as they have been transformed into literary fiction the first thread looks at the way melancholia must be worked through for mourning to occur and healing to happen the second thread looks at how symbolic acts of sacrifice can help to heal intergenerational trauma the third thread looks at the way people with avoidant attachment styles can begin to open themselves up to love again the fourth thread looks at how individuation can manifest as a response to nihilism meticulously researched and written with sensitivity the result is a sophisticated exploration of murakami's published novels as an evolving therapeutic project that will be of great value to all scholars of japanese literature and culture

truth is not found in fixed stillness but in ceaseless change movement isn't this the quintessential core of what stories are all about haruki murakami from the afterword to the city and its uncertain walls the long awaited new novel from haruki murakami his first in six years revisits a town his readers will remember a place where a dream reader reviews dreams and where our shadows become untethered from our selves a love story a quest an ode to books and to the libraries that house them and a parable for these strange post pandemic times the city and its uncertain walls is a singular and towering achievement by one of modern literature's most important writers

as a young man haruki murakami played records and mixed drinks at his tokyo jazz club peter cat then wrote at the kitchen table until the sun came up he loves music of all kinds and when he writes his words have a music all of their own much of it learned from jazz

haruki murakami and his early work first discusses murakami haruki's real life activities and interests such as his self identity as a japanese novelist his position in the japanese literary canon music translation and running in this context three short stories as pivotal to his early writing career are examined including the second bakery attack the elephant vanishes and tv people written in an easy style to read and with the content full of references to select contemporary popular culture and consumer products his fiction in general tends to invite criticism of irrelevance and frivolity against their nonsensical even humorous appearance however the book's close analysis reveals his persistent concern with the plight of today's humanity in postindustrial reality through the bewildering stories murakami delivers a covert critique of aspects of the sociopolitical system including unbridled consumerism relentless pursuit of efficiency and electronic media saturation that brings people into total submission without their realization of the plight in which they are placed in this respect these short stories rival his acclaimed novels while showing his essential concerns and literary creativity more succinctly

this book will focus on analyzing the different aspects of japan's representation in the novels of haruki murakami and david mitchell it is proven that murakami creates and recreates japan without implementing any orientalist features or exotic imagery in the works of both authors the intent to depict a new world of japan stripped of traditional stereotypical traits becomes clear the difference between murakami and mitchell's representation of japan lies in the difference between japan as seen by the japanese and japan as seen by modern westerners but both are correct images of japan it is a recreation of the global image of japan in that sense the texts of murakami and mitchell are complementary representations of japan through east west cultural dialogue studying the representations of japan and japanese national character helps to understand the role of murakami and mitchell in the formation of a new image of japan the de-stereotyping of anachronistic ideas about japanese national exclusivity enriching by doing so the world literature with new visions of the country and its

culture the purpose of the comparative analysis of english and japanese literary works performed in this work is to reveal both deep analogies and differences in the representation of the image of japan actualizing the national specificity of the texts this research advances the understanding of how both general and specific components of literary representations of japan and japaneseness are manifested in the east west cultural dialogue
