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the orphan in eighteenth century fiction explores how the figure of the orphan was shaped by changing social and historical circumstances analysing sixteen major novels from defoe to austen this original study explains the undiminished popularity of literary orphans and reveals their key role in the construction of gendered subjectivity

what makes us believe anything told to us by another person how does this work

in scenes of judgment where we operate almost exclusively with report from others like a trial by jury thomas reid declared in 1785 that we give the name of evidence to whatever is a ground of belief and such defining formulations both echo and were echoed by seminal writings on the law of evidence the ideas of belief and evidence have depended upon each other for a very long time belief in evidence traces the relationship between these terms as they expressed themselves in british evidence thinking and in nineteenth century novels that explicitly engaged the problem of when and whom to believe and on what evidentiary grounds in his foundational essay concerning human understanding 1690 john locke foregrounded the problem of forming judgments about things we have not experienced ourselves but only heard from others his ideas provided a foundation for the first systematic treatise of english evidence law geoffrey gilbert s the law of evidence 1754 locke s anecdote of the king of siam which illustrated how we weigh probabilities in determining what to believe found itself repeated with astonishing frequency over the next two centuries wherever legal scholars aimed to illustrate the problem of belief in evidence this period should be understood as a sort of age of evidence during which evidence thinking and evidence law became solidified in disciplinary terms and dispersed well beyond the legal profession both following and complicating legal notions of evidence and belief the novel in england in the era of literary realism addressed many of the same mediating factors delineated by locke and the law of evidence the age and experience of the persons called upon to believe the perceived character of witnesses and defendants the number of witnesses and how the experience that shapes us is conditioned by place and identity staging complex scenes of judgment authors like mary shelley jane austen elizabeth gaskell george eliot wilkie collins and anthony trollope all confronted the problem of belief in evidence which became central to their models of realistic representation

this book brings together the experiences of anglo american teachers and discusses some of the challenges which face teachers of nineteenth century fiction suggesting practical ways in which these might start to be overcome by considering the constantly changing canon issues related to course design and the possibilities offered by film and ict

editors jean michel ganteau and susana onega have assembled a volume which addresses the relationship between trauma and ethics and moves one step further to engage with vulnerability studies in their relation to literature and literary form it consists of an introduction and of twelve articles written by specialists from various european countries and includes an interview with us novelist jayne anne philips conducted by her translator into french marc amfreville addressing her latest novel

quiet dell through the victimhood vulnerability prism the corpus of primary sources on which the volume is based draws on various literary backgrounds in english from britain to india through the usa the editors draw on material from the ethics of alterity trauma studies and the ethics of vulnerability in line with the work of moral philosophers like emmanuel levinas as well as with a more recent and challenging tradition of continental thinkers virtually unknown so far in the english speaking world represented by guillaume le blanc nathalie maillard and corinne pelluchon among others yet another related line of thought followed in the volume is that represented by feminist critics like catriona mckenzie wendy rogers and susan dodds

through study of female writers of the eighteenth century novel kukkonen explores how literary texts draw on embodied experience and the lived reality of literature and reading she approaches embodied style through the approach of 4e cognition which understands the mind as embodied embedded extended and enactive in the environment the work breaks new ground in showing the promise of 4e cognition for cognitive poetics and how the fiction writing develops diverse repertoires of embodied language for the history of the novel

energy ecocriticism and nineteenth century fiction novel ecologies draws on energy concepts to revisit some of our favorite books mansfield park jane eyre great expectations and the war of the worlds and the ways these shape our sense of ourselves as ecological beings barri j gold regards the laws of thermodynamics not solely as a set of physical principles but also as a cultural and conceptual form

that we can use to reimagine our historically vexed relationship to the natural world beginning with an examination of the parallel inceptions of energy and ecology in the mid nineteenth century this book considers the question of how we may better read and interpret our world developing a recipe for experimental reading and insisting upon the importance of literary studies in a world driving to ecological catastrophe

secrecy and community in 21st century fiction examines the relation between secrecy and community in a diverse and international range of contemporary fictional works in english in its concern with what is called communities of secrecy it is fundamentally indebted to the thought of jacques derrida jean luc nancy and maurice blanchot who have pointed to the fallacies and dangers of identitarian and exclusionary communities arguing for forms of being in common characterized by non belonging singularity and otherness also drawing on the work of j hillis miller derek attridge nicholas royle matei calinescu frank kermode and george simmel among others this volume analyses the centrality of secrets in the construction of literary form narrative sequence and meaning together with their foundational role in our private and interpersonal lives and the public and political realms in doing so it engages with the derridean ethico political value of secrecy and derrida s conception of literature as the exemplary site for the operation of the unconditional secret

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
