black churches in america have long been recognized as the most independent stable and dominant institutions in black communities in the black church in the african american experience based on a ten year study is the largest nongovernmental study of urban and rural churches ever undertaken and the first major field study on the subject since the 1930s drawing on interviews with more than 1 800 black clergy in both urban and rural settings combined with a comprehensive historical overview of seven mainline black denominations c eric lincoln and lawrence h mamiya present an analysis of the black church as it relates to the history of african americans and to contemporary black culture in examining both the internal structure of the church and
